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Brief Comment

A NUMBER of California tourists with whom this writer has talked recently have complained about the road from Midland on in to the Long Bell plant. "All the way from San Francisco, roads were eminently satisfactory, except this rough, dusty stretch," one of them said. This is the last season that condition will prevail. This Midland stretch is, in fact, in the status of a detour at the present time, pending completion of the Klamath river bridge and surfacing of the Midland-Greensprings section of the Weed-Klamath highway. If tourists are made to realize the fact that this is a temporary condition, they will not regard it as a matter of importance in consideration of future travel plans, nor will they spread false information among other auto travelers. We should not miss any opportunity to emphasize the true status of this stretch of rough, dusty road.

The strange position in which the Townsend convention's rip-snorting business has placed Mayor Willis Mahoney has drawn comment from several Oregon editors. "Where At is Mr. Mahoney?" asks the republican Oregonian. The democratic Salem Capital-Journal says: "Mr. Mahoney must either follow Townsend and join the third party, repudiating Roosevelt, or repudiate Dr. Townsend and support the president and be ousted from the OARP, like Gomer Smith. It's a dilemma created by his own demagoguery." It will be remembered that Mayor Willis, apparently sensing the anti-Roosevelt feeling among some Townsends, decided not to attend the national democratic convention at Philadelphia, where as delegate he would have a part in the re-nomination of President Roosevelt. We were told at that time that Gomer Smith and Mr. Mahoney, both then hoping to get into the senate on a Townsend platform, were following similar strategy. Smith later lost out in Oklahoma, and being no longer a candidate, summoned the courage to make a hot reply to some of the bitter anti-Roosevelt remarks at the convention.

Drought conditions in the Middle West inevitably focus attention on the value of reclamation. There will be no drought effects on western lands watered by federal reclamation works. About 3,000,000 acres in the drought region are green and growing and will have a normal 1936 crop. The federal reclamation service's report on water conditions in its projects emphasizes this fact, and it further publicizes the fact that water supply in the Vale, Klamath, Owyhee and Umatilla projects of Oregon (and California) are ample. On the Klamath, precipitation has been up, in contrast to some of the other projects. Even when rainfall was far under normal, there was ample water for most of the irrigated lands of the Klamath country.

Now that a scientist has come forward to explain the vivid coloring of Crater lake, we will enjoy Oregon's greatest natural wonder just as much as we did before. Unless, that is, some inspired composer from Tin Pan Alley should decide to inflict "Crater Lake Blues" on a long suffering world.—Bend Bulletin.

Railroad week comes to an end, with public interest in the railroads and what they have accomplished greatly stimulated. The spirit of initiative, cooperation and determination among railroad managements has been an inspiration to the country, the more so because of railroad week. It was a good idea.
