Lloyd predicted local thunder-showers this afternoon, tonight or tomorrow in eastern and southern Iowa, northern Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, southern Wisconsin and southeastern Missouri.

No precipitation was in sight for Oklahoma. Cloudy weather was forecast for tonight and tomorrow in Montana and Wyoming, with slightly cooler temperatures tomorrow in the extreme eastern portion of Montana and northeastern portion of Wyoming.

**WESTERN WHEAT UP**  
SAN FRANCISCO, July 18. (AP)—Spectacular jumps in wheat prices during the last two months have added around \$12,000,000 to the value of the crop in the three Pacific coast states.

Largely, if not entirely attributable to the midwest drought, prices have gone up from 72 cents a bushel on September delivery at Portland, to 89 cents—a rise of 16 cents a bushel.

California prices average about 18 cents a bushel higher than two months ago. Gains all along the coast range from 15 cents to 18 cents.

The indicated harvest for the 3 states is unusually large—some \$1,827,000 bushels, as shown in July 1 forecasts of the department of agriculture. This compares with a combined tri-state harvest of a little more than 75,000,000 bushels last year, and an average in recent years of around 75,000,000 bushels.
