

LEGION TO CHOOSE GIRL DRUM MAJOR

When the local American Legion drum corps parades in Roseburg next month, a winsome young Klamath county miss will assist Drum Major Davey Powell in leading the corps.

This was decided upon at the corps' last regular meeting this week, and final plans were made Friday by a committee consisting of Dewey Powell, Clyde Thompson, Tom Young, S. V. Pickett and Lee Schwab.

The lucky young lady will be honored at the pre-convention dance August 8, and will be guest of honor of the corps at Roseburg the following week. She will parade, take part in stunts and strut alongside of Leader Powell at the head of one of the outstanding Legion corps in Oregon.

She will be attractively outfitted with an appropriate, snappy outfit, including baton, boots and helmet, and will, as far as is known at the present time, be the only young lady of Oregon to serve as honorary drum major during the 1936 convention.

She will engage in every appearance of the corps during the convention days, August 12 to 15, with the exception of competition within the arena. Even then, with her corps, she will be introduced during the evening and have a place of honor on the field.

The Legion corps will have those girls qualifying sell tickets for their pre-convention dance, the one selling the most receiving the honorary drum major position for 1936 and 1937.

Those interested are requested to report to the May King studio, where they will receive any information desired.

Naturally the young ladies entering the race must be charming, capable of dancing, possessed of outstanding personality and with a keen sense of rhythm. The winner will be given special instructions in strutting, marching and baton handling during the final days as the corps drills at Modoc field.

The Klamath miss must be single and between the ages of 18 and 26.

The honorary drum major contest, when the winner will be chosen, will take place about 11 p. m. Saturday evening, August 8, at the armory.

The Klamath corps hopes to have 35 men in uniform, with approximately 30 taking part in competition.

It appears quite probable the corps will return the 1935 champions. Much of the music written for the convention has been composed by S. V. Pickett, outstanding musical drum corps instructor in Oregon.

CLEAR LAKE CAMP GIVEN HIGH RATING

TULELAKE, July 18.—Clear Lake biological civilian conservation corps camp is rated by A. B. Emery, district inspector, as one of the best in the entire nation. Emery's announcement followed Clear Lake's second consecutive capture of a pennant awarded to the camp in the Medford district with the highest rating for care of the personnel, educational facilities, quality of food, upkeep of barracks, general camp appearance and satisfaction of men in camp. Twenty-five camps are included in the Medford area.

The Clear Lake camp is continuing a strenuous work program inaugurated last spring. A crew of men is now at work building dikes at the lower end of Tule lake, where the government bird refuge is to be located.

Three men, formerly associated with the reclamation bureau, Almo Newton, E. E. Durkee and Lawrence Motschenbacher, all of Tulelake, have been employed to assist in handling the huge Northwest drag line weighing 45 tons and with a dirt capacity of one yard, which is to be used in throwing up the dirt bulwarks and nesting islands that will dot the area to be flooded.

Three large diesel caterpillar tractors and an elevating grader will also be used on the work. One new dump truck and a rock crusher, which will provide road surfacing and filler material, have been added to the equipment, according to Clark Fensler, camp superintendent.

Men from Clear Lake now located at the spike camp on Upper Klamath lake are erecting a five-room house, rustic in construction, just north of Rocky Point, near the old Beck logging camp. It will be used by a member of the biological survey.

Three skilled carpenters, Ben Schultz, Robert Wilcox and Harry Knoll, are working on the building, which is to be completed this summer.

A few changes in command of the army unit have been made at Clear Lake. Lieutenant Hammon, formerly of Camp Klamath, is temporarily in charge during the leave of absence of Lieutenant Rohner, who is spending several weeks in Oregon and Washington.

Lieutenant Bogus recently arrived from the 7th corps area in Iowa and has assumed the duties of mess officer. Lieutenant Ruppel has returned to his former home in Nebraska.

The Clear Lake camp is one of the youngest in this area, having been established only one year.

King's Savior Flees From London Mobs

LONDON, July 18. (UP)—Special Constable Anthony Gordon Dick, former royal navy stoker who saved King Edward's life Thursday by knocking a revolver from an Irish assassin's hand, went to work in the country Friday to dodge a worshiping public.

Dick, who has sold polish for a living for the past 14 years, devoted the day to selling polish far from London's laudatory throngs. As he left his home this morning a woman ran up, lifting his hand to her lips and exclaimed: "God bless you my boy for saving the king."

Napa High School Ravaged by Blaze

NAPA, Cal., July 18. (UP)—Fire destroyed the central section of the \$300,000 Napa Union high school and damaged the two wings of the structure Friday before it was brought under control.

The damage was estimated at \$200,000 by school authorities as they began an investigation to determine the cause.

Apparently the fire started in an attic over the main section. A woman storekeeper living near the school saw smoke issuing from under the roof eaves and summoned firemen.

A strong north wind hampered the fire fighters. Twice they had to flee to safety as walls crumpled and fell.

Idaho Mills Grant Loggers' Demands

SPOKANE, July 18. (UP)—Four mill operators in the St. Maries, Idaho, district granted 350 employees all demands of the three-week logging strike, announced Spokane headquarters of the I. W. W. today. Work was resumed Friday under the new wage scale and abided to all concessions.

The four camps granting the strikers' demands were the Larson-Johnson camp, Roddy and Schwab camp and Trumane Sines camp, all of St. Joe, and the Rogers Lumber company at Mica creek.

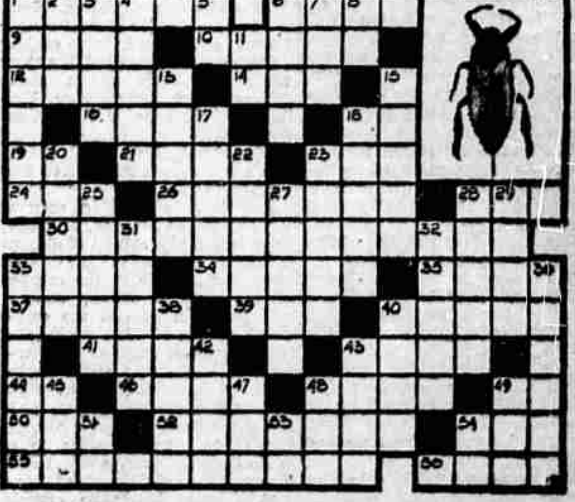

SCOTLAND YARD PROBES ATTACK

LONDON, July 18. (UP)—Scotland Yard, probing deep into King Edward's narrow escape from assassination and determined to increase precautions to protect British royalty, Friday called upon all witnesses of yesterday's attempt to come forward and aid in prosecution of the assassin.

Unwilling to accept the popular verdict branding George Andrew McMahon, whose real name is Jerome Brannigan, a crank, cockpot or drunkard, the police kept him at Brixton prison while they continued a thorough investigation.

King Back at Dock

The king, who returned to London from his Fort Belvedere country residence where he spent the night, read state papers, received his ministers and read telegrams of congratulation and felicitation from all parts of the world.

His majesty expressed surprise at the worldwide interest in him personally. It was made known at Buckingham palace that he was "tremendously impressed" with the number and warm cordiality of the messages.

McMahon's wife, a dark-eyed, pretty brunette, visited him early this morning.

Motive Uncertain

"I know nothing of my husband's detention until I picked up a newspaper last night," she said. "When I read it I could hardly believe my eyes. I rushed home. When my husband left home as usual yesterday morning he seemed his old self. I cannot understand why this happened."

Nor were the police certain as to what prompted McMahon to brandish a loaded pistol at King Edward as he rode down Constitution hill at the head of 6000 of his best troops. They were intent on determining the motive for the gesture of attempted assassination.

French Capitalists Face End of Power

PARIS, July 18. (UP)—Premier Leon Blum, head of France's popular front government, promised Friday to settle accounts with profiteering capitalists.

In a broadcast appeal to the nation after the chamber of deputies, voting to nationalize the French arms industry, gave Blum's government its largest parliamentary majority yet, the premier said of the capitalists: "We don't want them. We don't want them."

The chamber of deputies voted 484 to 85 to "take the profits out of war, ending a 30 years' debate on the subject. It debated only 6 1/2 hours in 3 1/2 sessions."
