

GRANGE PLANS ANNUAL PICNIC NEXT MONTH

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Pomona grange Saturday, attended by Amos Slack, president of the grange council, Mrs. John Taylor, lecturer of the Pomona grange and Mrs. H. H. Anderson and Mrs. L. Rena Slack, members of Pomona committees, plans were perfected for the Klamath-Lake county picnic to be held on August 8 and 9. Plans were also completed for the regular quarterly Pomona grange meeting to be held at Hly on August 8, according to announcement by L. Alva Lewis, master of the Pomona grange.

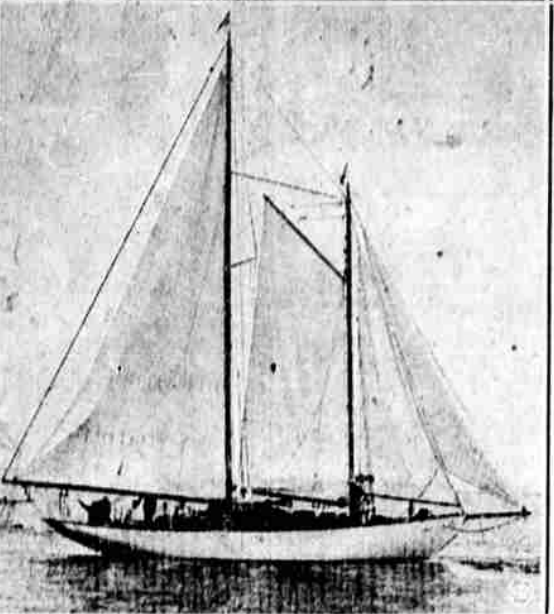
It was decided that the picnic would be a two-day affair starting immediately on adjournment of the Pomona grange on Saturday evening, August 8 at Booth's park just across the Klamath county line in Lake county on the Klamath-Lake county highway. The picnic is to be under the auspices of the Klamath and Lake Pomona granges with Klamath Pomona acting as host. All grangers, their families and friends will be welcome and are to attend prepared with camping equipment for one night.

Saturday evening a bonfire program will be held, including singing and games. The Sunday program will start at 9:30 a. m. with a baseball game between Klamath and Lake county grangers for the inter-county championship. At 11 a. m., will be devotional exercises and singing. VOLCANO SPITS IN QUAKE AREA

BOGOTA, Columbia, July 20. (UP)—A volcanic eruption showed the Ecuador border, with ashes and lava Saturday in the wake of an earthquake which leveled Tuquerres and damaged seven other towns.

Fourteen were known dead and 22 were gravely injured as a result of the earthquake, which occurred last night, with intermittent minor tremors today. Most of the injured were women and children.

The volcanic mountain was near Cerro Negro. Mountaineers evacuated their ruined homes and fled toward the lowlands. The eruption caused panic because many villagers had rushed to the mountains to escape the earthquake.

Political Feuds Continue Heavy quake damage was reported. Tuquerres, a town of 30,000 was reported in ruins. Destruction extended to Pasto, Tulcan, San Gabriel, Santander, Yasculi and Panama.

Political bitterness was not forgotten after the quake at Tuquerres. Two hours after the major tremor struck, the Gonzales and Garzon families engaged in a political feud on the streets. One person was killed, another gravely wounded, before renewed quakes put an end to the fight.

British Troops at Gibraltar Prepare For Emergencies

(Copyright 1936 by United Press GIBRALTAR, July 20. (UP) British troops were held in readiness early Sunday for an emergency that might require their presence at the Spanish border where the military took over command of the populous town of La Linea, on the Spanish side.

Martial law was declared in La Linea after an outburst of shooting that followed the attempt of a sentry to halt a suspicious automobile speeding toward the town. Only one person was reported wounded but the incident served to spotlight the high tension prevailing as a result of the revolt in Morocco.

As troops on the Spanish side were held in their barracks pending word that might send them post haste to the Moroccan protectorate, a report that the situation in Africa was most serious came from Tangiers. A prominent Spanish resident of the walled city of Tetuan said his native city was in the hands of rebels, that many had been killed and injured in the uprising

Gold Vein Found In Mojave Area

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., July 20. (UP)—A rich four-foot vein of gold, believed to be a continuation of the vein that produced a fortune in the early days, was discovered at the Governor mine, 45 miles south of Mojave Saturday.

The gold ore is reported to have been assayed at \$117 per ton. The mine was opened and originally operated by the late Henry T. Gage, former governor of California, but has been idle for many years.
