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weather and light showers to most of South Dakota. Some farm buildings were leveled by the wind. Half damaged corn in a 40 square mile area near Florence, S. D. The state's weather-caused death list rose to 20.

Selling orders inspired by more favorable weather conditions carried corn futures down

almost the full four-cent limit permitted as the Chicago pits opened, but later trading brought prices back to about a cent under Saturday's close.

Speculative buyers turned to wheat and that grain at times scored more than two cents a bushel rise.

Corn traders studied a report that a large part of Iowa, principal corn producing state, would with favorable weather hereafter yield 90 to 95 per cent of a normal crop.

The effect of the falling temperature was demonstrated in North Dakota, where the mercury sank to the sixties. Last week temperatures of 110 and above were common in that state.

A low of 67 degrees was recorded in Chicago today and the weather bureau predicted that temperatures in the seventies would remain until tomorrow at least.

While the middle west and northwest enjoy respite from the heat and drought, in the state of New York the effects of a prolonged-dry spell became pronounced. A rapid shrinkage in milk production was indicated. Water shortages were threatened.

LONDON ACCEPTANCE ADDRESS AWAITED

WASHINGTON, July 20. (UP)—That old problem in politics as in war—tactics—is pushing to the fore as party leaders await the speech by Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas accepting the republican presidential nomination in Topeka Thursday.

With new and potentially important factors such as drought, organized labor dissension and developments at the Townsend convention entering the picture daily, all hands are watching to see which particular issues the presidential candidates choose to stress and how they will maneuver their shock troops.

None of the candidates has committed himself publicly to a hard and fast course. But all have indicated determination to strike out aggressively with arguments subordinating party loyalties to fundamental principles.

(A radio broadcast from Seville in which the fall of the Madrid government was announced was reported by the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at Gibraltar. He stated the broadcast ended: "Long live Spain! Long live the army!"

(This same correspondent reported the number of dead in La Linea, near Gibraltar, was so great that authorities were collecting the bodies in trucks for mass burial.

(Spanish military planes from Africa were reported as continually passing over Gibraltar on the way to the interior of Spain. There was a general rush of refugees to Gibraltar from La Linea because of fears that rebel fliers would bomb syndicalists and communists there who were standing off rebel forces.

(In Gibraltar it was reported that the Spanish city of Malaga was in flames. Hundreds of refugees were streaming in hourly to Gibraltar with 7,000 arrived by mid-afternoon.

(The British destroyer Shamrock was ordered to proceed at full speed to Malaga.)

The Spanish government, summing up the situation shortly after noon, stated "except for Valladolid and Zamora, the rebellion has been broken completely or almost completely dominated" on the peninsula.

The official announcement stated Gen. Francisco Franco, leader of the rebellion, had fled from southern Spain by seaplane, apparently leaving his forces.

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CASA BLANCA, French Morocco, July 20. (UP)—Scores were believed killed or injured Saturday in bloody clashes between rebellious troops and civilians at Melilla, Spanish Morocco, where a general strike was declared following Friday night's military uprising.

Virtually all of Spanish Morocco was in the hands of the rebels, native runners from the Rif country, between the important garrison towns of Melilla and Ceuta, reported.

Destroyers Bring Troops

At least 15 persons were known injured in clashes with rebels at the towns of Elksar and Larache.

Two destroyers reportedly were dispatched from Ceuta to Melilla to land troops loyal to President Manuel Azana's left wing government.

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MADRID, July 20. (UP)—The Spanish government taking drastic measures to quell a revolt that flared in the African protectorate of Morocco issued a decree today dissolving all army units participating in the insurrection.

Foreign Legion Affected

A decree ordered home all troops whose officers and commanders participated in the

grave rebellion against the left-wing republican government of Premier Manuel Azana.

The decrees were presumed to affect the Spanish foreign legion, the famous fighting body of 18,000 men which put down the forces of Abd-el-Krim more than a decade ago. The exact number of legionnaires active against the government could not be estimated immediately.

Governor Dismissed

The decrees followed closely an order for the dismissal of the governor of the Canary Islands where two warships were sent to put down a military uprising which broke out simultaneously with the rebellion in Morocco in delecting both movements were part of a prearranged plan.

MADRID, July 20. (UP)—Spanish government planes rained bombs on rebel troops in Morocco Saturday as land, sea and air forces sped to Spanish Africa to quell a grave army revolt against the republican regime.

Not Spread to Spain

The government announced that the rebellion had not spread to Spain proper and that there was every expectation of suppressing it promptly. However, there was trouble in Barcelona, where 40 to 50 labor syndicalists boarded several vessels in the harbor and seized 50 rifles. Storm guards overcame them and recovered the rifles.

SUMMER SESSION GAINS ATTENTION

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 20.—Unusual interest is already noted in the post session of the University of Oregon summer school, scheduled from August 2 to August 25, and a substantial increase in enrollment is predicted by Dr. Dan E. Clark, director. The session will offer courses in continuation of those now under way, both in Portland and Eugene, and will make it possible to obtain practically a full term's work by combining the two sessions.

A faculty of 16 university and visiting educators will offer more than 40 courses in economics, education, English, history, law, physics, psychology and sociology. Visiting professors include Dr. Jay C. Knudsen, professor of phil-

osophy and education, University of New Mexico; Dr. W. E. Armstrong, Salt Lake City schools; and Dr. Curtis H. Walker, professor of history, Vanderbilt University. Regular staff members who will teach are: Dr. Louis A. Wood, professor of economics; Dr. J. R. Jewell, dean of the school of education; Dr. C. L. Huffaker, Dr. Ralph R. Leighton, professors of education; Dr. E. C. A. Leach, and Dr. Robert D. Horn, of the English department; Dr. Dan E. Clark and Dr. John T. Gause, of the history department; Carlton E. Spencer, professor of law; Dr. A. E. Caswell and R. E. Holmquist, of the physics department; Dr. H. R. Taylor, head of the psychology department, and Dr. P. A. Parsons, head of the sociology department.

Many of the courses have been arranged especially for graduate students. It is announced. Those of special interest include "Articulation of High School and College work" to be taught by Dr. Knudsen; "American Poetry and Contemporary Poets" by Dr. Horn; "Forces in American History," by Dr. Clark; "Employment Psychology," by Dr. Taylor and "Contemporary Social Movements," by Dr. Parsons.

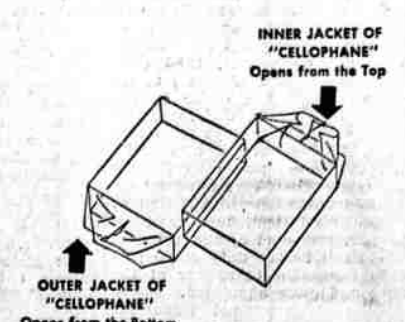

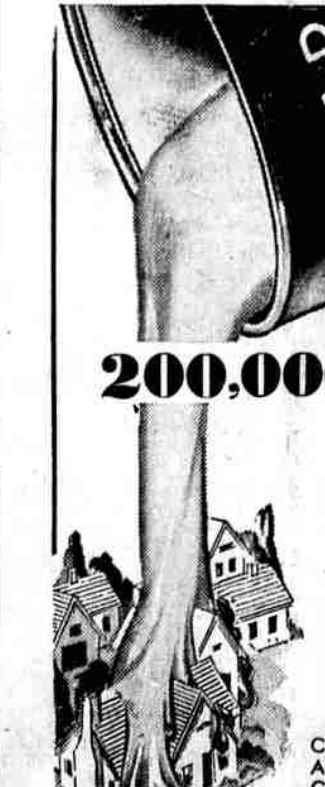
