GIRLS ASKED TO CALL FOR BLANKS

Klamath Girl Scouts who were unable to attend the camp rally held Monday evening on the Klamath Union high school lawn are requested to call at the offices of the chamber of commerce as soon as possible to obtain their camp application blanks, according to announcement by Mrs. Earl D. Gilbert, local scout director.

A two weeks' summer camp from August 9 to August 23 will be held again this year at the Boy Scout camp at Lake o' the Woods where the Klamath Girl Scouts and the Medford staff is anxious to know how many girls will attend from this city.

The application blanks are to be returned to the chamber of commerce with the registration fee of \$1.00 and the health certificates will then be given out.

The camp will consist of units of 16 girls each, grouped according to age. Each unit will be governed by a unit leader, two or more counselors and the patrol leaders. A registered nurse will be in camp the full time and the water front will be in charge of a senior Red Cross life saver and examiner.

Eleven Lakeview Properties Seek Postoffice Site

LAKEVIEW, July 21.—Eleven offers of property for the site of the Federal building were opened Monday by the postoffice department.

The A. L. Thornton lot west of Hotel Lakeview was offered at \$11,000; the A. J. Ousley lot south of the Ford garage was offered at \$5000; the Marvin theatre property adjoining the present post office at \$2550.

The May F. Swift property on the south side of the court house square was offered at \$2500; the Lloyd Ogle property at the junction of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway and the Fremont highway was offered at \$6000; the Ira Pilkington lot east of the Methodist lot was listed at \$3800; the Leithead property adjoining the Lakeview hospital on the west was offered for \$5500.

Erekat Petch and the local post of the American Legion made an offer of their lot south of the Marvin theatre for \$6000; the lot across from the southeast corner of the court house was offered for \$5400, and the Charles Tower property on the east side of the Ousley funeral parlor was offered for \$2750.

About half of the properties offered to the government contain 20,000 square feet, the area desired by the treasury department. An inspector will arrive tomorrow to examine the several sites and make the selection.

TROY, N. Y., July 21. (UP)—Seven boys and one girl, aged 11 to 18 years, were burned Monday by acid thrown on them by an unknown attacker.

Police reported the children were playing cards on a house porch when the acid was thrown, allegedly from a second story window.

Burns on heads, arms and legs were treated by a neighborhood physician and one boy was ordered to bed because of the seriousness of his burns.

AMERICAN TRADE BALANCE FAVORABLE

WASHINGTON, July 21. (AP)—Summarizing May exports and imports, the department of commerce reported today that the United States had a "favorable trade balance" of \$9,556,000 for the month.

This excess of goods sold over goods bought reversed the trend of three previous months, and compared with a \$10,160,000 excess of imports in April and a \$5,374,000 excess of imports for the same month a year ago.

The department said exports in May totaled \$209,466,000 and general imports \$199,910,000.

For the first five months of this year, it was reported, imports exceeded exports by \$3,669,000 the totals being \$972,837,000 and \$969,168,000.

This compared with a \$16,155,000 excess of exports for the similar 1935 period. Total exports for those five months stood at \$853,867,000, with imports of \$837,712,000.

Of total May exports, \$103,245,000, or about 50 per cent, were of finished manufactures.

Exports of non-agricultural products accounted for 77.6 per cent of the total, and agricultural products for 22.4 per cent.

May gold imports totaled \$169,957,000 compared with exports of only \$5,000, while silver imports of \$4,949,000 compared with exports of \$203,000.

OREGON SOLDIER TAKES OWN LIFE

SHANGHAI, July 21. (AP)—The military career of Orville M. Johnson, 32, ended today when he jumped or fell from the fourth floor of a hotel. Johnson, who was a native of Salem, Ore., was killed instantly.

Police said a note addressed to his wife, "Mrs. Orville Johnson, San Juan Royal, Philippine Islands," indicated he planned to kill himself.

Friends at Manila said he commented there, prior to leaving July 15 for the United States to visit his mother, that he might not return. He was an officer in the Philippine army.

Officers said his note ended with the words, "Forgive me for having brought this upon you."

Johnson was scheduled to leave for the United States today aboard the General Pershing.

The officer entered the Philippine constabulary in 1901 and later served as superintendent of the Baguio military academy. He also was once provincial governor of Lanao.

His widow, Mary, formerly of Virginia, is in Manila.

Unclaimed Key Offers Clue in Mystery Killing

ASHVILLE, N. C., July 21. (AP)—Authorities seeking to solve the murder of pretty Helen Cleveland, New York co-ed Monday turned their efforts to attempting to establish ownership of an unclaimed master key to rooms in the Battery Park hotel when the girl was attacked and then shot to death Thursday before dawn.

The key, which interests authorities was found in Miss Cleveland's room. Her own key was under a radiator. The master key will open any guest room in the hotel even with the door locked from the inside and with the guest's key in the lock, it was explained.

Eleven master keys issued to recognized employees of the hotel were traced and found to be in possession of their rightful owners, Sheriff Laurence Brown said. The hotel management did not know of the existence of an extra key.

The sheriff said he was prepared to release shortly a statement regarding an "important new development" in the murder mystery. But he would not elaborate on his statement.

Denver Suicide Sets Self Afire

DENVER, July 21. (UP)—William F. Smith, 55-year-old Denver real estate man, committed suicide late Monday by saturating his clothing with cleaning fluid and then setting it afire.

He died within an hour after the burst mass of flames, from the garage where he poured naphtha upon himself.

Efforts to administer first aid made by Harry Anderson, who saw Smith throw open the doors of the private garage and stagger out, were futile for he already was burned beyond recognition.

Hidden Taxes

ACCORDING to Representative Tabor, ranking republican on the appropriations committee of the house, the first job of the new congress will be to pass a \$2,500,000,000 deficiency bill to cover excessive New Deal spending.

That isn't all the bad news for the taxpayer. The democratic chairman of the same committee has predicted that the present rate of spending is going to continue, even though the administration has accumulated a deficit of about 18 billion dollars in three years.

Mr. Roosevelt has offered little hope. He stated at Philadelphia that if he is re-elected, the policies of the New Deal will be continued and expanded. That, of course, depends on whether he is also given a spendthrift congress, which is an important matter for the voters to be thinking about.

Candidate Roosevelt, in refraining to pledge a cessation of the New Deal spending orgy, is banking on popular ignorance of the ramifications of this tax business. He apparently thinks that millions of voters will go on unaware of the invisible giant that is taxation. Because they are not direct taxpayers, will they think that somebody else is footing the bill, as New Dealers would have them think?

The New York Trust company recently made a compilation that shows that in the fiscal year 1933-34, hidden taxes made up 59 per cent of the principal sources of federal tax revenue. In 1929-30, hidden taxes made up only 15 per cent. The invisible giant is getting bigger.

People who think that government spending is nothing to them, because the other fellow is footing the bill, are what is popularly known as "all wet." The average man pays \$2.88 a year tax on picture shows, \$3.84 on lights, \$4.32 on telephone, \$21.60 on clothes, \$3 on life insurance. The family that buys \$40 worth of groceries a month pays \$86.40 a year in taxes. The renter pays a lot more for his house because the taxes are high. These are just a few items that help make up the burden of invisible taxation, which is the reason that every individual should be interested, personally, in ending the orgy of government spending.

Don't Venture Over the Wall

AT Crater Lake rim there are a number of signs which warn: "Do Not Venture Over the Crater Wall." They were placed there to prevent such accidents as occurred Monday, when a 19-year-old Virginia youth was dashed to his death down the precipitous sides of the crater.

Possibly there should be more signs specifically citing the broad, safe trail, about which, it is believed, the Virginia tourists knew nothing when they attempted to go straight down the wall. Dr. George H. Adler, the coroner, believes that more trail signs are advisable.

The fact this was the first accident of the kind in the park indicates that few ever visit the rim area without knowing of the easy trail down the wall.

It is highly unlikely there will ever be another. Monday's mishap dramatized the significance of the warning signs on the rim.

Tom Mix Bad Roper, Faces Damage Suit

PORTLAND, July 21. (UP)—Harvey Deck, 77-year-old Jackson county prospector, charged in federal court Monday that Tom Mix, screen and circus cowboy, isn't much of a hand with a rope.

In a \$10,000 suit, Deck alleged that Mix tossed his loop at a horse during an exhibition in Medford May 5 and roped Deck instead. The prospector said he suffered serious injuries when dragged into the arena at the end of Mix' lariat.

Judge James Alger Fee allowed in part a motion by attorneys for Mix requiring Deck's complaint be made more definite and certain.

Average Man's View Landon Speech Topic

TOPEKA, Kan., July 21. (UP)—Governor Alfred M. Landon's acceptance speech to be delivered here Thursday night when he will be informed he is the republican presidential nominee will represent the "average American's views of modern governmental problems," the United Press learned Monday.

The statement was made by one of Landon's advisors who collaborated with the republican presidential nominee in preparation of the address.

"There will be no bitter criticism in the acceptance address," the advisor said.
