PRISONERS GET BONUS MONEY

RALEM, July 21. (AP)—The federal government paid \$22,941 to world war veterans at the state penitentiary, the amounts ranging from \$118 to \$1,562 being distributed among 38 men, the penitentiary officials informed Governor Martin today.
 In addition to the 38 who received bonuses which will be kept by the warden to their credit, there are 47 other veterans who either did not receive a bonus or did not serve more than 90 days during the war. Six other prisoners served in the Spanish American war. The largest bonus went to a life-terminer.

American flag, 10 are now serving life sentences for murder, while eight were sentenced to 20 years, eight to 15 years and 1 to 10-year terms.
 Two-thirds of the counties in the state committed veterans to the prison, 21 coming from Multnomah county, 12 from Klamath county, six from Josephine and five each from Douglas and Washington counties, the information stated.

CORN LEADER ON GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, July 21. (AP)—Corn became the grain market leader today, and soared in some cases to four cents a bushel overnight gain, the extreme permissible limit.

A flurry on the part of previous speculative sellers of July corn was an outstanding factor, because of comparatively small supplies on hand and as a result of a renewal of unfavorable weather prospects. Iowa dispatches said the corn crop outlook was only about 50 per cent of what it was before damage was done by severe heat and drought.
 Corn closed buoyant, 22-1/4 above yesterday's finish, July 91 1/2, Sept. 85-5/8, Dec. 81-1/2-1/4. Wheat in 4 p. Sept. 81-3/4-1/2, Dec. 81-1/4-1/4, Oct. unchanged to 1/4 higher, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 15 cents.
