PORTLAND SEWAGE FIGHT GOES ON

PORTLAND, Ore., July 22.—Portland's \$6,000,000 aquatic over the construction of a proposed sewage disposal plant found itself apparently as far as ever from settlement today, with possibility it would be right back in the laps of the voters.

The city council, voting 2 to 2, failed to pass the ordinance providing for the sale of \$6,000,000 in bonds. The ordinance was up for its third reading. Arguments pro and con raged for several hours preceding the vote.

The city's voters approved the \$6,000,000 bond issue three years ago when plans were about for a \$10,000,000 plant, part of which it was considered probably the federal government would pay. Validity of the proposed bond issue was upheld recently by the state supreme court.

The council's action, which leaves the matter for another discussion, came within 24 hours after Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, informed the city it must arrange to halt dumping of sewage into the Willamette river and Columbia slough or a law-enforcement demand would be turned over to the attorney-general.

The possibility that the matter again would be voted on appeared when Commissioner Bern introduced a resolution calling for another public ballot. The resolution will be argued next Wednesday.

SNOW TUNNEL JOB GETS UNDERWAY

CAMP ANSIE SPRINGS, Ore.—The construction of a snow tunnel 200 feet long under a 30-foot snowbank on the slope of Watchman peak in one of the projects being carried on by the men of CCC company 1634 in Greater Lake National park. The company, which recently moved here from Camp Oregon, is also engaged in the erection of a new entrance motif at the southern gateway, the construction of a foot bridge at park headquarters, the clearing of trails and a number of other improvement jobs in the park.

Five men are being employed on the tunnel under the supervision of A. P. Collins, park service foreman, and the job will probably be completed this week. The tunnel will enable park visitors to make the ascent of the Watchman much earlier than would otherwise be possible.

The foot bridge being constructed by the CCC men at park headquarters is a 20-foot structure of rustic style crossing a small creek. Logs are being used for stringers with smaller ones being used for hand rails. The work is being directed by L. N. Foy, construction foreman.

The entrance motif will be a pillar of logs supporting a hand-carved entrance sign. It is to be located on the east side of the Fort Klamath highway at the south entrance.

A number of other projects are also being carried on by the company which will be located in the park throughout the summer.

Eleven Army Planes Will Fly to Klamath on Friday

Eleven army airplanes of the 321st observation squadron from Pearson field are scheduled to arrive in Klamath Falls around 1:00 o'clock Friday afternoon, according to word received from Captain Paul E. Buffers, regular army instructor of the unit. The planes will remain at the Klamath airport until Sunday morning, when they will take off about 10 o'clock for their return trip north.

The fleet will include seven PT-3A airplanes, two O-19B type and two O-25C types. Fourteen officers and five mechanics will make the trip. The officers are: Captain Burrows and Major John H. Gardner, regular army air corps; Major Howard G. French, Captain Laurence B. Hickman, Glen W. Seal, Sumner C. Palmer, Jr., Estley R. Farley, Lieutenant Walter A. Hazelwood, Arlen E. McCarty, Leo L. Melton, Herbert A. Reynolds, George L. Thomson and Charles J. Langknecht, all of the air reserve. Captain Cecil J. Ross, medical reserve, flight surgeon, will also accompany the squadron.

This reserve organization is on its annual two weeks' tour of active duty. A portion of their training includes an extended cross country trip. The planes will leave Pearson field, which is just across the Columbia river from Portland, about 8:30, Friday morning. The PT-3A type ships will be gassed at Prineville then proceed to Klamath Falls. The other ships have sufficient gasoline to make the trip without additional gas or oil.

The men will make their headquarters at Company 568 Camp Klamath, B-11 civilian conservation corp organization near Merrill. The company is commanded by Captain William S. Akers, air reserve, also a member of the squadron. Men from Company 568 will serve as guards for the army planes while on the ground.

Many Political Parties Add to Spain's Turmoil

Multiplicity of political factions has been a characteristic of republican Spain. At the present time 25 parties are represented in the cortes.

Of these 15, with a total representation of 206 deputies, may be considered rightist or center. The left, with 14 parties, holds 267 seats.

Monarchist deputies number 28. The remainder of the right-center is largely republican although in many of the parties there is a leaning toward fascism.

Of the leftist parties, socialists, marxists, syndicalists and communists command 109 seats, with the socialists, numbering 88, the strongest of the left groups.

As in France, the left parties are grouped in a "popular front" with common political objectives.
