FRESH HEAT WAVE SENDS CORN UP

CHICAGO, July 22. (AP)—Corn prices went soaring anew late today, scoring fresh gains of more than three cents a bushel. Predictions of a fresh heat wave in the corn belt tomorrow with temperatures of 105 degrees stimulated buying on a big scale. The steepest upturn of prices was in July corn. That delivery broke the season's top price record.

Corn closed strong at nearly the day's top point, 1 cent to 31 above yesterday's finish, July 944, Sept. 902-91, Dec. 828-9; wheat 4-3 up, Sept. \$1.04-1.04, Dec. \$1.04-1.04; oats at 4 decline to 1 advance, and 4 prices varying from 7 cents setback to an equal gain.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, July 22. (AP)—A few Boston wool houses were getting numerous bids while others found the market very quiet today. Quotations appeared to be fully steady to firm on fine wools. Very little interest was being shown in medium grade domestic wools. Some of the buyers who had been bidding around 30 cents scored basis for average to good French combing fine original territory wools raised their offers slightly and were receiving moderate quantities at prices in the range \$3-85 cents.

Others steady to a point or more higher included Auburn, United Aircraft, American Smelting, Pullman, Continental Oil, American Water Works, Socony, Louisville & Nashville and Texas Corp.

Two Negroes Held For Questioning In Girl's Murder

ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 22. (UP)—Two negro employees of the fashionable hotel where Helen Clevenger was attacked and murdered last Wednesday were added Tuesday to the list of persons held for questioning about the crime.

The two negroes—Edward Fleming, bellhop, and L. D. Roddey, elevator operator—were questioned secretly for more than two hours by Sheriff Laurence Brown, who then ordered them confined in the Buncombe county jail.

Sheriff Brown said tonight that the "key to the whole situation" rests with Daniel Gaddy, hotel night watchman who also is in custody.

"I don't suspect him of having committed the crime," Brown said, "but I do expect him to tell me something tomorrow."
