

LAND, SEA FIGHTS RAGE IN SPAIN

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while the government said it was in full control of the northern and eastern provinces.

Foreign Action Looms
The report of a spectacular political development in Madrid—the formation of a “red committee”—eclipsed the military situation.

Although the purpose of the red committee was not made clear, observers assumed it was intended to take over the government if the present regime fell.

The threat of international action for the protection of foreign nationals hung over the country as the fighting increased.

The British admiralty accelerated the movement of warships to the trouble zone. Britain's Gibraltar colony faced a food shortage as the rebellion cut off all supplies.

From Paris came the report that a decisive battle was imminent north of Madrid between rebels and government forces.

Great Army Ready
Gen. Emilio Mola's insurgent army, augmented by peasant volunteers, was reported near the capital.

The government announced that 150,000 loyal troops stood ready to meet the attack.

It was the center of bloody fighting in the north. Rebels besieged the city, but were unable to drive out the government forces.

A message from General Cabanero, chief of the rebel forces at Zamora, reported heavy fighting west of Barcelona.

The government took over the cathedral and other Barcelona churches as “people's institutions.” Some churches in Madrid have been burned.

The government announced later it had suppressed uprisings in Barcelona, Gijón, the Balearic islands, Almería, Málaga, Alcañiz de Henares, El Padro and the capital.

The rebels broadcast denials over captured radio stations that their troops had been defeated in Barcelona and other cities.

In Spanish Morocco, where the revolt originated, a general engagement between loyalists and rebels was reported as the roar of artillery was heard over the bordering international zone of Tangier.

Adams Assistant County Doctor

Dr. J. Martin Adams has been named assistant county physician, and will do part-time work in the care of the indigent sick.

Some time ago relief medical cases were shifted to the office of Dr. Neil Black, the county health officer. Previously they had been handled independently of the public health office by Dr. W. T. Rogers.

The county health board voted in favor of handling the extra work on a requisition basis, but the relief cases should be handled by a part-time assistant county physician.

LONDON BROADCAST
Officials of Klamath republican organizations on Wednesday urged that all who can get radio reception tune in at 6:30 p. m. Thursday for the acceptance speech of Governor Landon. J. C. O'Neill, chairman of the republican central committee; William Kuykendall, president of the Young Republican club, and U. S. Balentine of the Republican club, issued the statement.

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turned from a Colorado vacation, holiday-sprited Topeka draped bunting even on fire hydrants.

The chamber of commerce said the crowd would be the biggest ever here—more than 50,000 perhaps 100,000 persons.

Great Picture Shown
Another “biggest” was a giant portrait of Landon which covered five stories of a ten-story building.

Among the prominent visitors expected to sit on the rostrum on the south steps of the Kansas statehouse with Landon tomorrow night are at least 31 members of the notification committee, many republican national committee members, and members of congress.

Other expected guests include two former cabinet members—Patrick J. Hurley of Oklahoma, ex-secretary of war, and Arthur M. Hyde of Missouri, ex-secretary of agriculture—and Governor Harry W. Nice of Maryland, and Col. Robert R. McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune.

Those arriving today saw a city swathed in red, white and blue bunting, decorated with Landon and Knox pictures and bright with yellow sunflowers.

WASHINGTON, July 22. (AP)—As Topeka blossomed out in its finest bunting today for Governor Alf M. Landon's acceptance speech tomorrow night, republican leaders continued to predict a sweep, and a democratic campaigner, Governor Paul V. McNutt of Indiana, declared “ill-omened elements of our society” are back of Landon.

The Kansas governor's speech, to be delivered about 8:30 p. m. (CST) after the notification ceremonies, will cover a wide range of subjects, advisers said.

One of them indicated that in addition to probable emphasis on farm relief, unemployment, federal spending and taxation, and the constitution, Landon will outline his opinions on governmental attitudes toward organized labor.

Speaking in Indianapolis last night for the democratic national committee, Governor McNutt declared that the personality ascribed to Landon by his managers “inevitably suggests an individual particularly susceptible to the influences of stronger minds and more ruthless wills.”

“Just who are the people to whom he is willing to be obligated in the unlikely event of his election?” McNutt asked. “Can they be other than the group of which the Du Pont liberty league is characteristic, and William Randolph Hearst, whose first visit to and endorsement of Governor Landon has been justly described as the kiss of death?”

designation “red” might range from allied communists and socialists to anarcho-syndicalists.)

500 Dead in One Day
The official list gave 500 killed in Madrid during the subjugation Monday of rebel garrisons. One hundred rebel colonial troops were estimated to have been killed when they attempted to land at Algeciras in the south.

A division which arrived from El Pardo claimed 40 rebels were killed and many wounded at Manzanares in a bombing by loyal airplanes which drove them out from the beautiful old castle where they had taken up a position.

Casualty lists in other sections were not stated, although they were understood to be heavy in view of serious fighting at Zaragoza, Cadiz and Alcala de Henares.

Before communications with London were severed the government, claiming important victories in the north and south, announced the rebel movement was disorganized and on the verge of collapse.

Barcelona, one of the centers of the rebel uprising last Friday, was said officially to have been taken over by loyal forces through bitter street fighting in which 500 were killed and 3,000 wounded.

The slaying of Francisco Ascaso, labor leader, while leading an attack Monday on the Dresen artillery barracks was disclosed when his name was published in a list of casualties.

IMPROVEMENTS AT COURTHOUSE URGED

The county court Wednesday took steps to bring about improvements on the courthouse grounds, and County Engineer Frank Z. Howard in a few days will invite bids on the job.

Plans call for a five-foot sidewalk to replace the present gravel walks around the courthouse, within a few feet of the walls of the building. Money for this purpose was budgeted last fall, it was stated.

Howard also will prepare plans for a change of the back door of the building. At present the steps there are inadequate and the door opens inward, proving awkward for persons leaving the building on that side. A new stoop will be constructed.

It also is planned to build retaining walls on the back side of the courthouse to prevent cars from running on the grass.

County Judge George Grizzle said that Klamath is about the only county in the state that has not beautified its courthouse grounds in recent years.

WHOOPING COUGH CASES DIMINISH

PORTLAND, July 22. (AP)—Whooping cough cases in Portland and Klamath county virtually disappeared in the past week after showing an increase previously, a report of the state department of health showed today.

From a total of 20 new cases in Portland the previous week and eight in Klamath county, the disease declined to four new cases here and none in Klamath county.

TEMPERATURE DOWN SEVERAL POINTS TODAY

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ton and La Grande recording the highest temperature, 106.5 degrees yesterday. It was the highest of the year there and the sun showed no signs of relenting today.

Clouds appeared over La Grande today but quickly disappeared as the sun rose along with farmers' apprehension over damage to the spring wheat crop. The minimum there last night, 71, was the highest of the year.

Western Oregon began to experience slightly cooler weather with the thermometer falling to 70 degrees at Salem, the coolest since Sunday. It was 88 at Eugene, two degrees under Monday's record-breaker and Portland got off with 84 degrees Tuesday, the coolest since Saturday.

North Bend, cooled by the Pacific, recorded another 64-degree temperature Tuesday, making it once more the cool spot of the state.

GEOLOGY STUDENTS STUDY IN KLAMATH

Sixteen geology students from Miami university, Oxford, Ohio, arrived in Klamath Falls Wednesday after visiting the Lava Beds monument. They were to leave later in the day for Crater Lake.

Prof. Bennett T. Sandefur, professor of geology at the university, is in charge of the tour, and stopped at the chamber of commerce to register the cars in Oregon.

He said that he conducts such tours annually into the west, but that this is the first year the party has come north by the inland route, through Mt. Lassen country and the Lava Beds. He said they found this route much more interesting from a geological standpoint.

The party will have covered 10,000 miles in ten weeks of travel when the tour is completed, Prof. Sandefur stated.

News of Oregon

PORTLAND, July 22. (AP)—A hearing of a case involving the custody of 10-year-old Kathleen Jordan, who is in the care of a children's home and is sought by her father, heard a warning from Judge L. P. Howell that any further attempts to influence him through his family might be punished.

The court said that various persons have called his home and attempted to present information through his relatives.

“I hope this was done in ignorance, but if not, it is extremely reprehensible,” he said. “If persons have done this with an appreciation of what they have done, am afraid it will be necessary to adjudge them guilty of contempt.”

MEDFORD, Ore., July 22. (AP)—A demurrer to W. H. Gore's claim to \$88,000 for services in connection with the passage of the Oregon California land grant tax refund bill alleged today that Gore's suit was not filed within the statutory time limit and that insufficient grounds for action were presented. The demurrer was filed by Jackson county.

ASHLAND, July 22. (AP)—Registration at the Southern Oregon Normal summer school session increased 100 per cent this year, Dr. Walter Redford, president, said. The enrollment is nearly 100.

BAKER, July 22. (AP)—A 40 per cent increase in the 1936 cut of timber by the Oregon Lumber company appeared probable, officials said today after reviewing six months' operations.

BEND, July 22. (AP)—Workmen blasted their way through yards of rimrock on the new Warm Springs cutoff from Madras to Portland in the past week, using more than 17 tons of dynamite.

JURORS UNABLE TO REACH VERDICT

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay, who presided at the trial, discharged the jury. The case will be tried again.

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LINDBERGH'S FLY TO VISIT GERMANY

BERLIN, July 22. (AP)—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh landed at Staaken airport today after a flight from Cologne. The American flier said he

had an excellent trip all the way from Lympe airbase, England.

Air Minister General Hermann Wilhelm Goering, who invited Colonel Lindbergh to Germany, was not at the airport to greet him. He was in southern Germany.

Nevertheless, it was learned authoritatively, a meeting between Lindbergh and both Reichschancellor Adolf Hitler and General Goering had been arranged.

Definite times had not yet been fixed.

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
