Montana Democrats Renominate Murray

BUTTE, Mont., July 23. (UP)—Senator James E. Murray Wednesday was virtually assured the Montana democratic nomination for United States senator on a basis of tabulated returns from two-thirds of the precincts voted in Tuesday's primary election.

Murray held a lead of about 8000 votes over his nearest opponent, Congressman Joseph E. Monaghan, with unofficial reports from 850 precincts.

Congressman Roy E. Ayres jumped into the lead today for the democratic nomination for governor, and tabulations of 850 precincts gave him a 1700-vote advantage.

Farmer Killed by Infernal Machine

CAPE CHARLES, Va., July 23. (UP)—Curry Thomas, prosperous 48-year-old farmer, was killed instantly and his bride of two months injured critically when a package they had picked up at the postoffice here late Wednesday exploded on their way home.

The 35-year-old wife, Elsie, was taken by a passing motorist to a hospital at Massawadox. She was suffering from abdominal, eye and hand injuries.

Details of the tragedy were not available immediately.

WASHINGTON, July 23. (UP)—An American woman has been wounded in street fighting in the Spanish rebellion at Guadarrama, near Madrid, the state department was advised Wednesday.

The report from the Madrid embassy did not give the woman's name nor the extent of her injuries.

News of Oregon

ALBANY, Ore., July 23. (UP)—The body of an unidentified man presented police with a puzzle today. The body was found near the Southern Pacific tracks at Millersburg. Clothing was scattered along the right-of-way and the pockets of the man's trousers were turned inside out. The theory was advanced that he had been robbed and thrown from a freight train.

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—Federal Judge McNary dismissed Joe Abalos's suit to enjoin the federal government from enforcing provisions of the Taylor grazing law, on motion of Assistant United States Attorney Manley Strayer. A federal indictment involving the grazing law is pending against Abalos, an eastern Oregon stockman.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23. (UP)—Mrs. Harriet B. Manning, 37, resident of Portland since coming here from San Francisco in 1875, died at her home late yesterday. Four sons, all of Portland, and a daughter of Albany survive. Her husband, George F. Manning, of the Manning Warehouse company, died in 1913.

HILLSBORO, Ore., July 23. (UP)—Guseth wounds incurred by 11-year-old Harry L. Depp of Portland resulted fatally to the youth in a Portland hospital. The Washington county sheriff held 13-year-old Hugh Babcock temporarily, on request of the district attorney, for questioning concerning the accidental shooting near here.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23. (UP)—Portland has a "good chance" to be chosen the 1937 convention city by the national Townsend organization, Dr. Ralph I. Shaddock, state Townsend manager, said here on his return from the Cleveland party.

Dr. Shaddock also said the Oregon delegation at Cleveland was much in the limelight and commented that Mayor Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls was a "prime favorite with the crowd".

The state area manager said Multnomah county Townsends would meet within the next two weeks to name an independent candidate to compete for the congressional post held by Representative William Ekwall, and possibly nominate independents for the state legislature.

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—The rabies campaign in Portland produced an unexpected denouement today with the assertion of seven members of the Animal De-

tense society that they would seek the custer of E. E. Chase, city veterinarian.

John Schroeder, chairman of an investigation committee, said the members believed Chase created an "unfounded" rabies scare and kept tourists away. More than 5,000 dogs were executed, 2800 owners delivering their pets to the society because of a fear of infection, and all despite the fact that "not a single case of human hydrophobia has been reported during that period," he claimed.

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—Mayor Carson told Gov. Martin, in a letter today, that the people of Oregon must get in a fighting mood over advertising of the state least California rob them of "the natural benefit of Bonneville dam."

"If those people (Californians) have their way, we will have to pay the same rate for Bonneville power as they pay for power from Boulder dam," Carson asserted.

The mayor urged a state appropriation to advertise Oregon to the heat sufferers of the midwest.

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—Mrs. Amelia Kell, about 60, a widow, lost her life last night when she apparently became confused by traffic on Sandy boulevard and was struck, police said, by an automobile driven by Eugene B. Hanford, Cascade Locks.

Officer James Hunt said the woman was crossing the street near the middle of a block. A routine charge of involuntary manslaughter was filed against Hanford pending a verdict by a coroner's jury. Hanford was freed on bail.

The woman was Portland's 40th fatality since December 1.

BONNEVILLE, July 23. (UP)—A 32-foot power launch of the U. S. engineers, the Sandy, lay at the bottom of the swiftly-flowing Columbia river today while divers attempted to locate the craft and salvage it.

The boat sank without loss of life last night when it was swamped while towing a haulback line to the navigation locks, where the steamer, the Dalles, had been battling the strong current in an attempt to reach The Dalles with a cargo of oil.

In some manner, the line apparently was fouled and the operator of the Sandy, opening the throttle, felt the boat nose under the water, turn upward, striking The Dalles and capsizing.

Henry Rosenback and Richard Holbrook, aboard the Sandy, leaped to the steamer and the launch disappeared, sucked down near the power house by the terrific current.

Several Killed in Alleged Bombing Of Fur Factory

CHICAGO, July 23. (UP)—Two bodies were recovered tonight from wreckage of the National Fur Dressing and Dyeing company plant, which collapsed after an explosion late Wednesday, fire department officials announced.

Other bodies could be seen, the coroner's office reported, but could not be extricated immediately.

Nine persons were taken to hospitals, three of them burned severely in the fire which enveloped the three-story structure and had not been controlled three hours later.

Plant owners told police no explosives were used in cleaning the furs. The plant had experienced labor trouble four months ago, they said, but it had not been serious.

Hyman Cohen, 55, part owner, said only a bomb could have caused the blast.

Liquor Board May Ban Women From Beer Parlor Bars

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—The Oregon liquor control commission tentatively decided late Wednesday to curtail the privileges of women in beer parlors.

It proposed to bar women from drinking at bars, either seated on a stool or with foot on rail, and to limit their qualifying to booths or tables.

Complaints against women bar-drinkers were heard from women's clubs and civic organizations. The commission authorized its attorney, Austin Flegel, Jr., to confer with dispensers' groups.

"Will it be possible legally to separate the sexes in a place of legitimate business?" asked Chairman L. H. McMahon.

"In the old days, women were not permitted to enter saloons," Commissioner Jewett remarked.

"And some of our beer parlors are worse than the worst of the old-time saloons," interjected Attorney Flegel.

Townsend Nominee To Oppose Ekwall

PORTLAND, July 23. (UP)—Oregon Townsends soon will select an independent candidate to oppose Congressman William A. Ekwall, republican, and will endorse and campaign for candidates for the state legislature.

Dr. Ralph I. Shaddock, state area manager, said Wednesday his return from the Cleveland convention.

Dr. Shaddock said Frank Arbuckle, Los Angeles, western Townsend director, had authorized selection of an independent to oppose Ekwall—whom the Townsends failed to "get" in the primary election.
