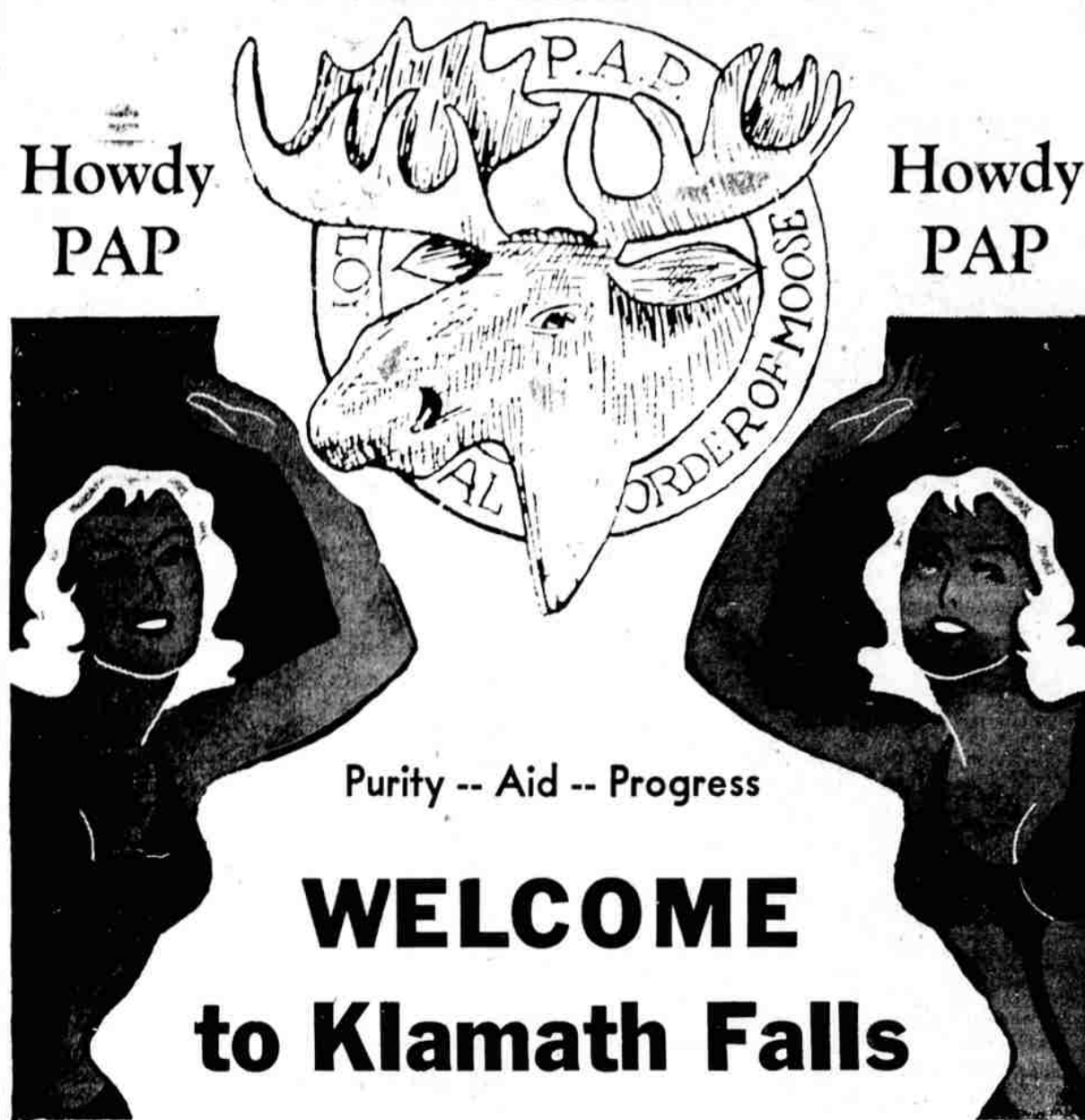

Host Lodge Boasts Pioneer In Growth of Moose Order

William A. Barron, well known in social and business circles, was an outstanding pioneer in the upbuilding of this international fraternity, Loyal Order of Moose.

When he enrolled as a member of the Moose, he was then number 283 in the entire Moose order. Barron spent many years on the road preaching the philosophy of the Moose to every red-blooded, clean-thinking, honest fellowman that he could contact. Of course he didn't sell the idea of the fraternity to everyone he challenged. But he alone was responsible for the starting and building of many subordinate Moose lodges. His services being of such value, he was many times compelled to hold offices in various lodges simultaneously, until the regular executive board could be established, causing him to travel many miles to keep up his active duties.

Started in 1906 as a co-worker of the now Hon. James J. Davis, director general of the Loyal Order of Moose, and knowing and understanding the ultimate value that this fraternity would be to the civilized world and with the realization that Mooseheart (then only a vision) would be an outstanding monument to society and a credit to his country, Barron worked and toiled diligently in this humanitarian endeavor.

As the work progressed and the fraternity grew, with Mooseheart becoming a reality in 1913, no did Barron grow, until in 1916 he was chosen as one of the supreme lodge officers at the national convention held in

Pioneer

San Diego, Cal. Barron served the Moose in the capacity of a supreme lodge officer for the next four years.

Often Honored

He has had many honors bestowed upon him by the lodges he has served and by the supreme lodge of the world. He is a past dictator of the Omaha lodge, of which he is a life member, as well as of other lodges to which he gave his time as their chief executive or dictator.

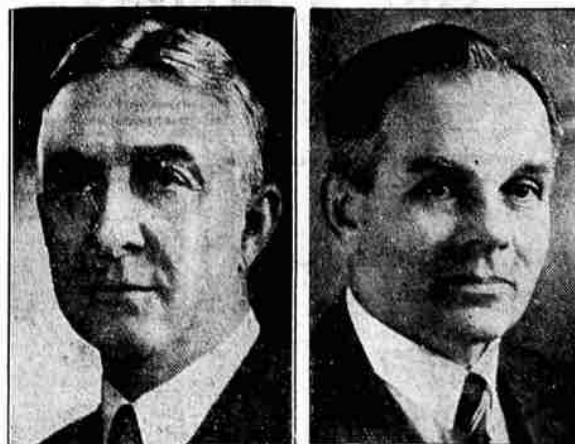
Barron came to Klamath Falls a few years ago and established a business here. Always with the Moose fraternity in mind, he immediately gave his time to the Klamath Falls lodge of which he became a social member, later serving as dictator in his very capable manner in 1932. He also helped materially in the functions of the "Legion of the Moose" (an integral degree of the order) becoming a very active Legionnaire.

Invalid Today

Besides being a member of the lodge and Legion degree, Barron is a member of the Moose Alumni, Fellowship Degree of Merit, the Veteran's degree, and has reached the ultimate of conferred degrees, "the Pilgrim Degree of Merit," highest award of the fraternity.

At present Barron is residing at 112 South Third street in Klamath Falls, where he has been bedfast for over a year. His Moose associates keep him company and he still directs much of the activities locally even though he is bedfast.

National, State Moose Heads



Both to attend the annual convention of the Oregon State Moose at Klamath Falls this weekend are Walter S. Ruff of Canton, Ohio (left) supreme dictator of the fraternity, and Charles P. Poole of Eugene, president of the Oregon State Moose association. Ruff was elected supreme dictator or national president last July at the national convention in Boston after having risen gradually through the scale of high offices in the order. At the Cleveland convention in 1932, Ruff was elected supreme councilman; in 1933 at the convention at Mooseheart, supreme prelate; and at the Atlantic City convention in July, 1934, he became supreme vice-dictator. Like Ruff, Poole has advanced step by step through the degrees of the state fraternity to the high office he now holds. It is anticipated by his Pacific coast associates that Poole will be the next western man to attain the heights of the Supreme Corum. He has filled his trust in a more than praiseworthy manner during his term of office.

Parade Big Convention Event

Klamath Falls' people are expected to turn out in large numbers Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, when the Moose convention parade is staged. Wide latitude is offered those entering the parade. Floats, bands, stunts, clowns, drill teams, or any appropriate feature is permitted. Invitations have been issued to all fraternal, civic, and military groups here to participate in the parade. A handsome trophy is to be presented to the individual or organization with the best entry. The parade will start at Second street and Klamath avenue, and will move through the business district to Modoc field. Chairman of the parade committee is D. W. Sargent.
