

Star Mermaid Ousted from U.S. Olympic Team

DRINKING ENDS IN DISMISSAL

Officials Will Not Let Eleanor Holm Jarrett Compete.

BERLIN, July 24. (P)—Lovely Eleanor Holm Jarrett, sun-loving swimmer, lost a frantic appeal for reinstatement on the American Olympic team today.

A sub-committee headed by Dr. Joseph E. Rayercroft of Princeton heard the swimmer's tearful pleas as special trains carried the American team from Hamburg to Berlin but ruled that the decision which dropped Mrs. Jarrett from the squad for repeated violation of training rules forbidding drinking and late hours must stand.

All-night Party Held

Warned previously for her participation in an all-night party in which one of her escorts was Charles MacArthur, playwright husband of the actress Helen Hayes, Mrs. Jarrett drew down upon her head the wrath of the Olympic committee by another escapade yesterday. A member of non-Olympians attended the party. Miss Hayes was not present.

Mrs. Jarrett admitted she had been drinking but said she had not realized "how seriously the offense would be regarded." She pleaded for another chance and promised she would "train and not touch another drop."

Other members of the women's swimming team are circulating a petition asking the committee to give her another chance.

Balks at Return

The 27-year-old swimmer definitely balked at the Olympic committee's ruling that she return to the United States on the Bremen, sailing tomorrow.

The swimmer, broken up by the committee's drastic action, asked Olympic officials not to "ruin my life."

In response to the swimmer's pleading, Avery Brundage, committee president, said: "We gave you every chance. You have only yourself to blame. Now you've got to take it. I appreciate how you feel but you forced our hand and we had no alternative. I can tell you the committee's mind definitely is made up."

Party Didn't Interfere

"I know I have been drinking too much and I'm all wrong," Mrs. Jarrett told Dr. Rayercroft. "I can't put into words how badly I feel now. All I am asking is a chance to face the committee and tell them, on my word of honor, that I did not realize how seriously the offense would be regarded."

"I've been night clubbing and having a good time for the last three years, always doing as I pleased, going where I liked, drinking what I wanted and when I wanted."

"The night before the final tryouts I was up all night partying with my husband (Art Jarrett, singer and actor), but I won my race the next day."

"Nobody ever told me that was all wrong but it was my fault that I didn't realize that circumstances were different on an Olympic trip. I'm on the spot now. I feel like jumping overboard but will train and not touch another drop if I'm given another chance."

Whole Team Affected

Dr. Rayercroft, who has a daughter of about the swimmer's age, talked to Mrs. Jarrett in fatherly fashion but told her he saw no prospect of the committee changing its mind.

"What you don't realize, Eleanor," Dr. Rayercroft continued, "is that your case is not just your own affair but has affected the entire team and reflected on us all."

"Your friends tried in every way to convince you that good behavior was essential if you wanted to remain on the team but you openly flouted their judgment as well as our authority."

It was disclosed that vain attempts were made to keep Mrs. Jarrett below decks last evening after the stateroom party had continued for hours. She insisted on

TRIBE VAULTS TO 2ND PLACE

Cleveland Stages Sensational Winning Streak.

If the surging Cleveland Indians catch the Yankees in the current American league pennant chase—and that seems a lot more likely now than it did two weeks ago—the man who picked the moment for announcing Steve O'Neill's re-appointment as manager of the Tribe can take a large share of the credit.

That announcement, timed as it was to hit the Indians at their lowest ebb, will go down in the books as the smartest psychological move of the season.

Won 11 Out of 14

Since then, they've taken 11 out of 14 starts, have shown the hitting and pitching that made the experts pick them as potential pennant timber for the last two years, and have shot from fifth to second place, cutting the Yanks' lead to eight games.

They lost only their second start in 12 days yesterday, dropping a 9-8 decision to the Boston Red Sox, but only after a powerful uphill climb that saw them come from behind a 9-8 handicap to all but tie.

The Yankees, meantime, finally solved the pitching of the lowly St. Louis Browns with an 18-hit attack and ended their longest losing streak of the year at three games with a 10-3 victory.

Joe DiMaggio, who has snapped out of his hitting doldrums since the start of the current western tour, belted two homers as Monte Pearson chalked up his 13th pitching victory.
