

DEATH DRIVER ADMITS GUILT

LAREVIEW, July 24.—Merle Nickerson pleaded guilty in circuit court here Thursday to a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

Nickerson was the driver of the car which last week struck and fatally injured Mrs. Con O'Keefe as she was crossing the Fremont highway near Silver Lake.

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay, who heard Nickerson's plea, withheld sentence until Nickerson's past life can be investigated.

The accident to Mrs. O'Keefe had a tragic sequel when Frank Melroom, who was rushing her to a hospital in Bend, became blinded by dust and his car struck a culvert. He was killed in the wreck, and Mrs. O'Keefe's body was found in the car. It was believed she died before the second accident.

State police said that the dust that blinded Melroom was made by Nickerson's car, when the Colorado man decided to pass Melroom on the way to the hospital.

Washington WPA Strike Called Off

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 24. (UP)—Workers agreed Thursday to return to Clark county WPA projects tomorrow when a strike called by the workers alliance crumbled under an adverse vote of relief employees.

At a mass meeting of WPA workers, 362 voted to return, 23 voted to continue the strike, and 150 members of the alliance refused to vote. Later a committee from the workers alliance approved the proposed resumption of work when county officials said they would reopen the question of pay and would attempt to launch more projects to spread employment.

Excavations For Capitol to Start By September 15

PORTLAND, July 24. (UP)—The Oregon capitol reconstruction commission decided at a meeting late Thursday that basement excavation for the new statehouse may start by September 15 and at the same time plans will be in shape for advertisement for bids on the general contract.

The commission said Oregon granite and both black and white marble will be used if quarries can deliver to the contractors at a cost equal to that which might be obtained elsewhere. Oregon walnut will be used, at the recommendation of Architect Morris H. Whitehouse, in the main corridors and certain public rooms.

Chairman J. A. McLean suggested that the commission's committee, which inspected granite and marble deposits in Oregon and recommended their use, also view wood murals at Eugene and elsewhere in Oregon for decorative uses.

As many other kinds of Oregon wood as possible, including myrtle, alder and pine, will be used for woodwork in various offices.

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Quarry Explosion Fatal to Worker

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 24. (UP)—A terrible explosion in the Vail rock quarry, touched off when an air drill struck a charge of dynamite left by the night crew, instantly killed one man and injured four—two seriously—Thursday.

A man about 45, identified only as Bonner, who was operating the drill, was killed. His remains were not recovered. Today was his first day of work in the Vail quarry.

LAFAYETTE, Ore., July 24. (UP)—This town apparently has outgrown its water supply. A threatened shortage led Water Commissioner John Ralney to post on store windows copies of an old ordinance forbidding watering of lawns and gardens "except from the hours of 6 p. m. to 8 p. m."

Many residents started hauling water from wells. One nearby dairyman admitted posting a guard over his water supply.
