Klamath Girl Scouts Prepare for Summer Camp Program.

Girl Scouts of Klamath Falls met Monday night on the high school lawn for a rally preparatory to their camp activities for the summer which will center at the Boy Scout camp at Lake O' the Woods. They will join the Medford girls for two weeks of fun from August 9 to August 23.

These temporary plans have been made pending the completion of the Girl Scout camp there next year, according to Mrs. Earl Gilbert, local director.

A large number of girls and their parents were present at the rally, at which plans were announced and camp bulletins distributed. Those girls who have not obtained them are asked to do so as soon as possible at the chamber of commerce. They give full details of the camp program, fees, time of registration, etc.

Chief feature of the rally was a talk by Mrs. Gilbert giving an interesting picture of her experiences in southern California scout camps recently. Mrs. Gilbert and Miss Ella Redkey took the camp councilors' training course given at the Santa Monica Girl Scout camp located about 100 miles from Los Angeles at Big Pine, after which the local director visited several other scout camps as guest of Miss Esther Ansell of the national staff. Miss Redkey has not returned to Klamath Falls as yet, having registered at the University of California for the summer session.

Games and singing were enjoyed by those present at the rally, and many new songs, obtained by Mrs. Gilbert on her trip south, were learned and added to their already large repertoire.

The local camp program is

part of a nation-wide movement to provide healthful summer activity in the out-of-doors, combined with educational and character building opportunities.

One thousand camps with at least one hundred thousand girls in them is the expectation of the national Girl Scout organization, according to Mrs. Walter N. Rothschild of New York, chairman of the camp advisory committee.

The 1936 camping season was officially launched with the opening of Camp Andree Clark at Briarcliff, New York, on July 3, for its sixteenth year. This world famous camp, which is the only one conducted by the national office of the Girl Scouts, already boasts registrations from such distant states as California, Texas, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Minnesota.

"This year Girl Scouts will have a greater variety of camping experiences to choose from than ever before," Mrs. Rothschild said. "They may spend their vacations on land or on sea; in canoes or in sailboats; afloat or on motorized egypte trips, when they will ride by day and stop overnight at Girl Scout camps along the trail they have planned."

"They will find romance and adventure in cruises along the coast and on lakes and rivers throughout the country; in mountain climbing in New England and pack trips in New Mexico."

"Whether they camp on the shores of Lake Osaipsee among the foothills of the White Mountains, in the heart of the Rockies or in the giant redwoods of California's giant Redwood trees, Girl Scouts will live according to the standards of the national organization. That means they will camp in small groups, not en masse, and will observe the safety standards that have been approved by the Girl Scout national council."
