High point in the activities of the Women of the Moose, gathered in convention here over the weekend, was the luncheon meeting at which the local chapter was hostesses at the Bohemian Club cafe Saturday noon. The honored guest of the occasion was Mrs. Jane Debus, grand regent from Washington, D. C., who was principal speaker at the luncheon. Miss Debus has been making a tour of the western states and British Columbia.
