CHAMBER PLANNING ANNUAL CROP TOUR

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The agricultural committee of the Lake county chamber of commerce was to hold its annual crop tour Sunday. About 50 merchants and stockmen expected to tour the Goose Lake valley with Chairman Victor W. Johnson and the members of his committee to inspect the outstanding farms.

The stockmen are very much interested in increasing their yield per acre of forage crops. The party was to inspect the dry land forage crops of Glen Turner, Francis Smith and Olaf Peterson who were the prize winners in the recent chamber of commerce dry land grass seedling contest.
