NEWSPAPER LINEAGE SHOWS INCREASE

CHICAGO, July 27. (AP)—Advertising Age said the week ended July 18 showed the volume of newspaper advertising placed by merchants of 66 major cities exceeded the corresponding period of 1935 for the 21st consecutive week.

The volume was 13,555,890 lines, an 8.6 per cent increase over the 12,484,429 lines for the corresponding week last year. For the year to date, the total of 477,701,231 lines was 5.2 per cent ahead of the 454,042,046 lines during the same period of 1935.

Fugitive Back at Salem Asylum

SALEM, July 27. (AP)—One meal every two days proved too strenuous for Dean Welch, who escaped ten days ago from the state insane hospital, he told authorities when he returned to the institution voluntarily last night.
