KLAMATH TAX COLLECTIONS 68.27 PER CENT

City of Klamath Falls tax collections now run to 68.27 per cent, inclusive of back taxes, according to a report from City Treasurer Ruth Bathany. Taxes on 1935 assessed to date total 49.9 per cent.

This shows a good improvement over last year. Mrs. Bathany said. At the same time, tax collections only totaled 38 per cent and the total for 1935 amounted to 62 per cent. In 1933, only 60 per cent of the taxes were collected in the whole year.

The total 1935 levy was \$235,408 and collected, to date, is \$117,443.84. The following table gives this information on city taxes for the past six years:

Flour Bombs, Barbed Wire Barricades Face Marshal, Aides on Eviction Mission

NEW YORK, July 28. (UP)—Women threw pepper and flour bombs, children waved flags and 200 spectators booed as Marshal Daniel L. Ricks led three burly negro assistants Monday, in smashing through a barricade to evict Mr. and Mrs. Toni Maxwell and their nine-month-old baby for nonpayment of rent.

Wielding fire axes and house wrecking bars, the doughy crew stormed the barricade of sandbags and barbed wire at the Sunnyside, Queens, home, but a bombardment of flour and pepper from women locked within checked the advance. Police were called, and, still coughing and sneezing from the white silt which filled the air, the evictors reformed lines and charged again.

Sandbags Slashed
It took an hour to slash through the chest high sandbags topped by barbed wire at the entrance of the two-story home. The entire hallway was a barbed section of "no man's land." Grinning through the peeling aerial attack, the crew brushed off the flour and said: "That doesn't bother us. We're just hired to do this job."

Piece by piece, furniture was carried out into the streets to the strains of "America" and "Home, Sweet Home," sung by a woman draped in an American flag. As the first chair was thrown out, Mrs. Maxwell fainted. Her incubator baby was handed over the barricade to its grandmother next door, and a doctor from the crowd revived Mrs. Maxwell.

Defeated Demo Candidate Runs As Townsend

BUTTE, Mont., July 28. (UP) First definite split in Montana democratic ranks was revealed Monday when Congressman Joseph P. Monaghan, democrat, Butte, announced exclusively to the United Press that he will run for the United States senate in the November elections as an independent candidate.

The congressman said he will run as a progressive. Townsend candidate at the direct request of Dr. F. E. Townsend, head of the Townsend old age pension movement.

The telegram from Dr. Townsend urged Monaghan to file immediately and promised him full support of the pension groups.

"We shall elect you in November," the telegram read. "Shall bulletin all our clubs in your state to give you their support as a personal favor to me."

Monaghan was defeated for the democratic senate nomination by Senator James E. Murray in the Montana primary election last week.

Chance Remark Leads Youth to Admit Murder

TACOMA, July 28. (UP)—Laverne Marks, 23, arrested on an automobile theft charge, by a chance remark Monday admitted murdering his boyhood chum, Robert Bernstein, 24, near Clintonville, Wis., July 13. Captain of Detectives Cliff Osborne announced.

Marks, arrested under the name of James Billings, confessed shooting Bernstein "without motive or premeditation" in their camp on a river bank near Clintonville, Osborne said. Marks said he was the son of the Rev. Edward W. Marks of Clintonville.

The youth was arrested near Olympia Saturday night, charged with theft of a taxicab at Tacoma. He also was accused of stealing two cabs at Seattle last week.

During questioning Marks admitted he was in a "bad jam." "On top of that, you're a wanted man back there, too, aren't you?" Osborne demanded, without any basis for his question. Marks paled, then said: "Yes, I killed him, but I didn't think anyone knew."

After further questioning Marks dictated a full confession.

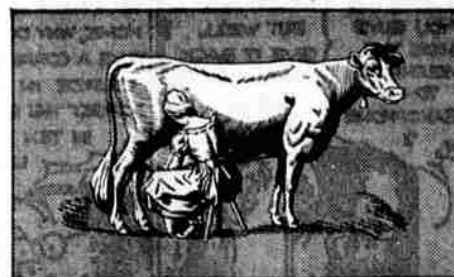
