Astoria Resents American Legion Baseball Slight

ASTORIA, Ore., July 28. (AP)—Considerable resentment met word received here that Woodburn's junior league baseball team would play in the state finals this weekend without the formality of meeting Astoria in a third and deciding game of a district series.

Bern Burns, manager of the Astoria nine, said "Astoria did not forfeit any game to Woodburn and has no intention of doing so."

Burns said he told state legion baseball officials that Astoria would be unable to play Woodburn in Portland last Saturday after being notified of the game time only the previous day. He said he was promised the matter would be straightened out. "The first I knew of the so-called forfeit was when I read it in the Portland papers," Burns said.

Nate Lakefish of Portland, city chairman of the baseball event, last Saturday night quoted Paul Patterson of Hillsboro, state chairman, as saying Astoria's failure to put in an appearance for the third game constituted a forfeit. The teams divided the first two contests.

Talk of an injunction to prevent the play-off at Woodburn and of making the question an issue on the American Legion convention floor at Roseburg was heard here today.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, July 28. (U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Graded domestic wools in Boston were mostly quiet and quotations largely nominal. Buyers were making inquiries, but they were taking few wools. A little staple 2½ blood territory wool moved at a price on the low side of the range \$4.87 cents scored basis.

Very little interest was shown in graded medium territory wools, but some bids were made on medium fleeces at levels below the prices acceptable to dealers. Buyers were taking up little fine territory wool in original bags at prices about steady compared with last week.

RIISING PRICES QUOTED IN WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 28. (AP)—Rising prices for wheat late today as well as early formed an outstanding feature of grain markets.

Rallies of corn prices were also a late development, influenced by authoritative reports that every day was adding to irreparable crop damage. Diminishing receipts of domestic winter wheat attracted attention at the last, and so did word that the Dakotas and Montana were harvesting the smallest spring wheat crop on record.

Wheat closed nervous, 1 cent to 22 cents above yesterday's finish, Sept. \$1.06-1.06½, Dec. \$1.06½-1.07; corn 1½ advanced, Sept. 9½-10, Dec. 8½-9; oats 1½ advanced, and provisions unchanged to 12 cents up.

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
