The junior chamber of commerce has tentatively arranged to bring the Southern Oregon Normal school of Ashland and the Oregon Normal school of Monmouth here Friday night, October 16.

Both teams are agreeable and the field is available.

The date—October 16—is probably the best of the season. There will be no conflict with interscholastic football since the Klamath Pelicans will be in Ashland Saturday, October 17, for their annual game with the Lithians.

Mid-October weather conditions are usually favorable in this section of Oregon.

Southern Oregon Normal football teams have appeared here twice.

The Monmouth team is directed by Coach Wolfe.

Young Jean Eberhart, former basketball ace for the Oregon Webfoots, is the coach at Ashland.

Max Baer's Father Ill in California

SAN LEANDRO, Calif., July 29, (AP)—With a quart of Max Baer's blood in his veins, "Papa" Jacob Baer was recovering today from a severe nasal hemorrhage.

Max, himself, beat on his chest, announced he was in perfect condition despite the loss of blood he saved to save his father's life, and predicted he would regain the heavyweight fight title.

"Buddy and I argued for the privilege of giving pop some blood," Max said. Max won the argument after telling his father "if he took Buddy's he would be lay all his life but if he took mine he'd awaken feeling in fighting trim."

Doctors said Jacob Baer showed marked improvement after the transfusion.

Upper Division Clubs Find Tail-enders Hard to Beat.

By The Associated Press The Phillies and Dodgers appear to be going nowhere in the National league this year, but they are not giving up one bit of their past honor as the "giant-killing" crews of the big time.

They have been doing it for years—waiting until some club gets out in front or near the top, and then landing on it like a ton of bricks.

Four Games Split Bill Terry found that out when they beat his Giants out of the pennant two years ago, after his famous crack asking if the Dodgers were "still in this league."

The Dodgers and Phils have been applying themselves, respectively, to the Pittsburgh Pirates, who were in third place until they reached Brooklyn, and the league-leading Cubs.

Previously they combined to shove the Cardinals right out of the league by beating them in four of six games in successive series.

The Cubs came to Philadelphia Sunday with a grand chance to boost their league lead to a commanding margin, inasmuch as the Cards were not scheduled for Monday or yesterday.

The best they could get was an even break in the four games against Jimmy Wilson's wall-poppers, winding up on the short end of a 5-3 count yesterday, with Dolph Camilli smashing out a pair of homers, and rookie Claude Passau stopping the league leaders cold with six hits, leaving them only 34 games in front of the Cardinals.

Giants Gain Ground The Dodgers, although losing the finale to the Cubs, 9-5 in ten innings, took three of the five-game series with the Pirates, to slug them far out of third place and let their arch-enemies, the Giants, take over that spot.

Through the Cubs' setback and the idleness of the Cards, along with the Boston Bees, the Giants picked up considerable ground on the one-two clubs by coming through in both ends of a doubleheader with the Cincinnati Reds, 5-1 in the opener and 11-3 in the nightcap.

The Yankees maintained their nine-game American league lead with a 16-1 victory over the Tigers. Although Lou Gehrig hammered out his 31st homer and Johnny Murphy showed fine form in a three-hit, five-inning relief trick, the victory wasn't all "beer and skittles."

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Red Sox Must Beat Pelicans To Keep Pace

Interest in the forthcoming Red Sox-Pelicans battle to be held on Modoc field Sunday, is beginning to increase in baseball circles as the lowly cellarites of the Southern Oregon league are determined to upset the Sox at least once this year to make up for the three defeats which have already been handed them earlier in the season.

A defeat at the hands of the Pelicans next Sunday would leave the Sox entirely out of the pennant chase and the new 1936 championship would go to the winner of the Grants Pass-Glendale fray, which game is being played the same day at Glendale.

The Red Sox muffed a golden opportunity last Sunday to almost clinch the coveted pennant by losing to Glendale 4-1 in a loosely played game, this defeat being the first of the year for the Sox on their home field.

Just which pitcher will start for the Pelicans has not yet been announced by Jack Gove, manager of the club. In the last game between these two teams, Orlo Oakes, former Drake University athlete, pitched outstandingly against the Sox and the latter team was lucky to get away with a 4-3 win.

Onkes may get another chance next Sunday to prove his pitching ability.

Manager Francis of the Sox has not yet decided just which pitcher to use Sunday. Both Carlstrom and Hogan have been turning in good hurling records during the past few weeks and it is a toss up as to who will get the nod.

Lawrence Granger, who has been out of the game since July 4th, will be wearing the big mitt again in the coming fray which will strengthen the Sox materially.

Enthusiasm over the baseball situation ran so high last evening in one of local pleasure spots that a near battle ensued, causing the age-old feeling of "bad blood" between players which only adds to the interest of the game, both to players and fans alike.

A large turn-out for this crucial battle is expected as this will be the last chance to see the two local clubs in action against each other.
