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TRAVELING STUDIO EXPLAINS TALKIES

Have you ever wondered as you sat in some theatre watching a talkie unfold before you, just what gave the screen its voice?

Did you know, for example, that a small band of microphones hardly more than an eighth of an inch wide, is what causes the hero to say "I love you" just as his lips formulate those words?

This band is known as "the sound track" and it is one of the many fascinating and interesting secrets of sound motion picture recording and projection which will be explained to film fans of this city next Thursday when the far-famed Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer traveling motion picture studio arrives here on its goodwill exhibition tour of the world.

The traveling motion picture studio, a completely equipped Hollywood studio on wheels, comes to this city after crossing the continent from the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios in Culver City, California. On its arrival here it is to be opened for public inspection and public demonstrations and exhibitions of the filming and projection of talking pictures will be presented.

The public demonstrations are scheduled to take place from 4 until 7 o'clock in front of the "Peltan" theatre, the home here of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer pictures. A complete crew of camera and soundmen and movie making experts from the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios are accompanying the studio on its extensive jaunt around the globe, and during the time the studio is here these motion picture technicians will explain in detail the operation of the costly and intricate sound equipment carried aboard.

Visitors to the studio will learn just how talking pictures are filmed. They will be permitted to inspect the valuable motion picture camera and the amazing sound recording amplifiers which are used in the studios to record the voices of the stars. They will see the elaborate sound projection apparatus, used in the projection of the films onto the screen, and a comprehensive lecture on this subject will be delivered by the expert sound technicians with the studio on wheels.

Communists Dump Fascist Prisoners in Mediterranean

LISBON, Portugal, July 29. (UP)—Spanish communists defending Malaga against attack by rebel forces arrested 170 fascists and imprisoned them aboard a boat which put out to sea and returned empty, German refugees from the battle-wracked port reported Tuesday.

Hans Jehard, photographer, was among 58 German refugees who were brought here from Malaga by the steamer Humpo. He said the fascists were dumped into the sea because they had committed brutalities during the fighting for control of Malaga. Hospitals were ordered when the militia emerged victorious from the initial fighting a week ago.

Lisbon became a center of new interest in the Spanish civil war when Jose Maria Gil Robles, Spanish right wing leader, arrived aboard the steamship Avila-star from France.

He may stay in Portugal a matter of hours or for several days, but I hope to be in Madrid shortly," was Robles' only comment upon his arrival.

When the revolt began Robles flew from Madrid to his villa at Biarritz, France, from whence he maintained communication with General Emilio Mola, commanding rebel troops in northern Spain. After protests from the Spanish government that Robles was plotting revolt from France, the French authorities requested him to leave Biarritz and reside north of the river Loire. Instead he came to Lisbon.

G-Men Get Suspect For Royal Mounties

WASHINGTON, July 29. (UP)—The department of justice announced Tuesday that Tony Roma, wanted by the Royal Canadian mounted police on a charge of "conspiracy to traffic in narcotic drugs" at Ottawa, had been arrested near Fowler, Cal.

A report issued by J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the bureau of investigation, said Roma was taken into custody at a roadside eating place with the sheriff at Fresno cooperating.

'Twas a Fine Crop—for 'Hoppers!



How upon row of gaunt, parched stalks, every vestige of leaf and stem stripped from them by voracious grasshoppers—this was the dismal scene that greeted Charles E. Geiger, pioneer Oklahoma farmer, when, as shown above, he visited his bottomland cornfield near Blackwell, Okla. With the ravages of hoppers and drought combining to destroy forage and feed crops for winter use, Geiger admitted he had never seen anything like it in all his 71 years.

CCC NOTES

The new dragline which was purchased for Camp Clear Lake of the CCC is operating 24 hours daily. Three shifts operate the dragline. The first shift goes on at 7:00 a. m., and is relieved at 3:00 p. m. by the second crew. The third crew replaces the second at 11:00 p. m. and works until 7:00 a. m. Each shift is composed of two men. The work of the dragline at the present time is the construction of the seven-mile dike on Tule lake refuge.

It looks as though the Camp Clear Lake BF-1 is turning into some gigantic construction company. From June 24 to July 20, five pieces of heavy equipment were added. This makes a total of 25 units of construction equipment. This will make a total of 24 units. July 14, Clear Lake received three "60" caterpillars. The "cats" are Diesel powered and all are the same size. One is a specially constructed "bull dozer". The "bull dozer" has a 12-foot blade in front, a blade of native rock, snowplow and is used for piling dirt and cutting ditches.

Clear Lake also received a very large grader July 20. The grader will be used in the construction of roads which will enable passage to the many points of interest in the Tule lake, Clear Lake and Upper Klamath refuges.

The upper Klamath headquarters building on upper Klamath refuge is now underway. The foundation is made of native rock mortared together. The building is to be constructed of milled slab lumber.

A crew of the Clear Lake men are now constructing a road on the west side of Tule lake. The road is about 10 miles long, and starts at the California-Oregon state line and ends in the Modoc lava beds. This road will be on the main highway. Possibly before the year is over there will be at least 5,000 cars traveling this road en route to the lava beds.

A patrol cabin is being constructed on Tule lake refuge by Clear Lake men. The patrol cabin will be located on the new refuge which is on the south end of Tule lake. The cabin will serve the purpose of sheltering the biological survey and game, and fish officials when they are visiting the new refuge.

Vegetation is being put on the dike that the dragline is now constructing. Grass is being sown and then willow cuttings are set out. The purpose of this is to make the dike more solid and cause it to settle, consequently making it stronger.

Several miles of fencing is being put around Clear Lake refuge by Camp Clear Lake men. The fencing surrounds the entire refuge to keep the cattle, livestock, etc., out of the refuge.

The fencing program is also well underway at upper Klamath refuge. The fencing being done by the men at the spike camp, putting up 65 rods per day. The posts are driven by a pile driver.

The nursery near the headquarters building site is progressing very nicely. All of the plants are in bloom and putting forth blossoms. Naturally this makes the plans more promising for the transplanting of this vegetation on Clear Lake refuge.

The Catlin School for boarding and day girls occupies its own buildings, which are ideally situated on one of the residence hills of Portland, with large ground space for out-of-door life and sports.

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Wandering Mule Found 60 Miles Away From Home

Becky, a recalcitrant mule belonging to the Rogue River national forest, has been taken back to hard work at Camp South Fork, after straying 60 miles to Keno, where she was picked up as a stray.

The mule, after wintering in the Applegate country, was put to work on the South Fork two months ago. Possibly considering her age of 16 years sufficient to call for a pension, she broke out of her corral and showed her heels to sundry CCC boys who chased her through the woods.

Supervisor Karl Janouch of the Rogue River forest sent out a description of Becky and awaited developments. Traces of her sturdy feet were found on the sides of trucks and other forest equipment. The mule not only refused to work, but she damaged equipment used by others willing to labor.

Sheriff Low was notified when Becky was found at Keno. He in turn informed Rogue forest officials that the mule was in custody, and a truck was sent to carry her back to the South Fork camp, where plenty of hard work awaited her.

Transient Killed in Railway Yard

PENDLETON, July 29. (AP)—Two accidents, one fatal and the other near fatal, occurred in Umatilla county late yesterday.

In the railroad yards at Umatilla, Harry Sweet, a transient about 35, was killed when struck by a moving freight train.

In the other accident, Henry Samuel, about 78, of Milton, was accidentally shot through the head when he went into his barn to shoot pigeons.

He was taken to a Walla Walla hospital where his condition was reported as critical.

Hovey for remodeling a residence at 711 Pacific Terrace; \$100 to Safeway store at 1204 Main street; \$175 to L. Bonnotto for remodeling dwelling at 2020 South Sixth street; \$80 to J. V. Hendricks for construction of a garage in Second Hot Springs addition; and \$45 to the Foster and Kleiser company for erection of a panel sign.

Fireproofing Work Nearly Completed
