

G. O. P. CHIEFS IN SESSION AT HEADQUARTERS

CHICAGO, July 30 (UP)—The republican high command drew together Wednesday the threads of a nationwide campaign network and prepared to set it humming Thursday evening with a huge rally at the notification of Frank Knox.

The formality of advising the vice-presidential candidate of his selection as Governor Alf M. Landon's running mate attracted party workers from every state to the republican national headquarters.

Hamilton Slips

Their conferences and reports showed for the first time the complete picture of the organization which will stretch to every precinct where republican leaders hope to swing enough votes to drive out the new deal.

There was, as the party prepared for an enthusiastic rally in honor of Knox, only one slip in the proceedings. Red-headed National Chairman John D. M. Hamilton let the secret out at a luncheon of the Republican Service league when—in the presence of the nominee—he made public reference to the fact that Knox had been chosen vice-presidential candidate.

There no longer being any need to maintain the official fiction of notification day, Knox then made a short and punchy talk in which he virtually admitted that he knew about the ceremonies scheduled for tomorrow night.

Steiner Informer

The veteran representatives, headed by Hanford MacNider, reported enthusiasm for their organization activities in many states and mapped a campaign reaching "right down to the grass roots."

In addition, Hamilton, back with reports of an enthusiastic rally in Indiana yesterday, says the arriving party leaders and chairmen of various committees pressing the organization work in many different fields.

Senator Frederick Steiner of Oregon, who will formally advise Knox of his nomination, put the finishing touches on his speech and warned the democratic leaders to quit "evading the main issue—which is the new deal policies."

"Pop Gun Criticism"

"The Roosevelt administration is the issue in this campaign," Steiner said. "It must defend its failure to keep promises, to live up to its platform, its reckless disregard of public opinion in spending the people's money."

"If the democratic strategy is no better than this small pop gun criticism of Governor Landon's speech, the republicans will be certain to win. The people will not be distracted from the real issues."

TOPEKA, Kan., July 30 (UP)—Supporters of Governor Alfred M. Landon Wednesday were cheered by reports from eastern republican leaders that the Kansas presidential candidacy is gaining ground east of the Mississippi river.

Intimates of the governor reported he was pleased especially with a prediction by William M. Chadbourne, New York progressive leader, that Landon will receive the support of most of the progressives of America.

Chadbourne managed the successful mayoralty campaign three years ago of Fiorello H. La Guardia in New York. He supported the late Theodore Roosevelt in 1912.

Court Rules For Shareholders in Insolvent Banks

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 30 (UP)—Circuit Judge James T. Brand ruled in a test case brought by the state Wednesday that the state superintendent of banks is without authority to assess shareholders of insolvent state banks for more than their "individual" proportion of the spread between the bank's assets and deposit liabilities.

It was expected the ruling would affect all state bank liquidations in Oregon since 1932. Judge Brand held the 1931 state law providing for a full 100 per cent assessment on all shareholders whenever a state bank was closed to be unconstitutional.

Judge Brand's declaratory judgment in the case of Mark Skinner vs. A. E. Adelapenger and others, held that an original 100 per cent assessment against stockholders of the Bank of Southwestern Oregon was invalid. Return of \$15,047 in overpayments to shareholders of the bank was ordered.

BERLIN, July 30 (UP)—Two more Americans were out of the Olympic games today as Joe Church of Batavia, N. Y., and Howell King of Detroit, featherweight and welterweight boxers, started home aboard the S. S. Manhattan.

Officials said the pugilists became "homesick," but reports of training violations circulated through the Olympic village, reviving discussion of the case of Eleanor Holm Jarrett, who was dismissed from the swimming team for infractions of training rules.

Donald Bruce Hume of Olympiad, Wash., stroke of the University of Washington's eight-oared crew, came down with a bad chest cold today and was taken from the shell after a morning workout on the Olympic rowing course. Physicians ordered him to bed.

Hume's illness is the worst blow the American rowing camp has suffered since its arrival, and had Coach Al Ulbrickson badly worried.

"Hume means everything to us," Ulbrickson said. "It's not the same crew without him. Unless he recovers quickly and regains condition we won't have much chance."

Nearly two weeks remain before the Olympic rowing competition starts, on Aug. 11, so Ul-

brickson has hopes that Hume will be back in the shell.

Regardless of the apparent differences between Lawson Robertson, head track and field coach of the American Olympic team, and his Ohio State coach, Larry Snyder, over the best methods of conditioning Jesse Owens for the negro's bid for an Olympic triple crown, little doubt appeared today that the "buckeye bullet" was close to his top form again.

The coaches are understood to have smoothed out last night the differences which originated during the final tryouts and developed a few minor clashes after the American forces reached the Olympic village.

Robertson wanted Owens to have more practice at starting and to follow the schedule of the other sprinters, but Snyder ob-

jected and carried his point.

The Ohio State coach accepted the responsibility for the schedule variations, especially since the track and field committee had decided he was the best judge of Owens's requirements.

"All I am interested in is having Owens in the best possible shape," Robertson said.

It was agreed that Owens will have only one more brisk workout tomorrow and then take things easy. Jesse is confident he will be at his best. He says his legs "never felt better."

Owens's schedule calls for trials in the 100 meter dash Sunday with semi-finals and finals on Monday. The broad jump trials and finals and the 200 meter trials will keep the negro ace busy Tuesday.

"I still stand on my prediction Owens will prove the class of the world in all three events," said Snyder. "He knows he will meet some strong competition but the Olympic isn't worrying him so far as I can determine. Neither the crowd nor the spotlight will affect Jesse when he toes the mark."
