KLAMATH TO L. A. TIME REDUCED

Klamath Falls is three hours and 15 minutes from Los Angeles. That was the statement of Bill Randall, manager of the Klamath Air service, in a talk to the Kiwanis club Thursday noon. Randall said a Richfield Oil company ship made the trip in that time a few days ago.

The airport manager pleaded for greater local interest in aviation development, and he discussed the possibilities of getting regular service through here.

Some sort of government subsidy will be necessary, he said. Constant hammering for air mail service will eventually bring results, he predicted. Randall said that La Grande is making a strong bid for the northwest army air base. He said that Klamath Falls can offer everything that La Grande has for such a base. The back country here would be ideal for bombing practice. Fog conditions are good, and other factors would help to make Klamath's bid a strong one.

In discussing Medford's airport development, Randall said that there is not the private interest in aviation at Medford that exists here. He said the local port needs lights and beautification.

Dr. E. D. Lamb introduced Randall. The local air service may fly a group of Kiwanians to Seattle to attend the northwest convention. If that is done, the plane will be used in advertising Klamath's bid for the 1937 concave.

BUCK LAKE MAN GAME VIOLATOR

State police slipped quietly into the Buck lake country Wednesday and picked up Frank Norman, caretaker for the Oregon Muskrat Fur Co., on a charge of possessing deer meat unlawfully. Norman pleaded guilty in justice court Thursday and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or go to jail for 50 days.

Officers claimed that at the time they entered the caretaker's house, he was cooking venison on the stove. He told them he was preparing the meat, which he said had been left at the place by some one else, for his dog. The officers found parts of a deer in a sack in the cool spring near the house.

They also found three rifles and two shotguns in the place. In the woodshed they located a spotlight and a battery which they suspect had been used for spotlight hunting at night.

Norman told them that there was 15 feet of snow at Buck lake early this spring. He spent the winter at the place as caretaker for Dr. William Chandlee, Portland, general manager of the muskrat company.

NOTED UNIVERSITY EDUCATOR PASSES

EUGENE, July 30 (AP)—Richard W. Debusk, 58, professor of education at the University of Oregon, died last night at a local hospital following a sudden heart attack. Dr. Debusk achieved national recognition in the educational world for his work with atypical children, and for many years had conducted the summer session clinic here for teaching retarded children.

He was born at Shelbyville, Ind., October 23, 1877. He graduated from the University of Indiana in 1904, and received his doctor's degree from Clark university in 1915. In the same year he came to Oregon, where he had since been. He was teaching his regular classes up to a week ago.

Dr. Debusk was for many years consultant to the Portland school board. He was a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, American Association of University Professors, Society of College Teachers of Education, American Child Health association and other professional organizations.
