

AUTO MISHAP NEAR PEREZ KILLS TWO

Lily June Folsom, 17, and Francisco Munoz, 40, were killed, and two persons injured in an automobile crash near Perez at 3:45 p. m. Wednesday.

The injured are Mrs. Eleonora Romero, 33, who suffered a broken arm and chest injuries, and Mrs. Ybadel Romero, 24, who suffered critical internal injuries.

On Level Stretch
The scene of the accident is one of the most level stretches of the Klamath Falls-Albion highway. Police said the crash occurred when the automobile in which the four were riding struck a soft spot in the road shoulder and turned over.

Authorities said the Folsom girl was driving at the time of the accident. Both she and Munoz suffered crushed skulls and broken necks.

Grass Returns to Ungrazed Ranges, Gabrielson Finds

PORTLAND, July 30 (UP)—Ira N. Gabrielson, chief of the U. S. biological survey, returned to his former home of Portland Wednesday enthusiastic over prospects of restoring range grass to lands made barren by grazing, through the "rest cure" method.

He said grass had staged a "comeback" on the 20,000-acre Charles Sheldon antelope reserve in Nevada, about 75 miles southeast of Lakeview.

"Our success with the restoration of bunch grass and other grasses on our Nevada antelope refuge is almost unbelievable," said Gabrielson. "For two years we have had the land fenced against cattle but allowed more than 2000 head of antelope to roam at will, and the grass has come back.

"Our success should prove to cattlemen that grazing lands can come back if cattle are kept off for a few years. In future years we may let cattle on the land again."

PRICE UP WITH DAMAGE REPORT

CHICAGO, July 30 (AP-USA)—Official announcement half of the corn crop in six leading states has been damaged beyond recovery swept corn values straight upward four cents late today.
