

UNUSUAL CASES FILED THURSDAY

Two unusual suits, one seeking indemnity for losses suffered in a forest and brush fire, the other asking an injunction to prevent union workers from interfering with a non-union restaurant owners' business, were filed in circuit court Thursday.

The fire damage case was brought by Orson H. Beal against Dunn and Baker, contractors. Beal owns ranch property adjacent to the Dunn and Baker rock crusher, and on June 24 the place was swept by fire destroying, according to the complaint, "grass, bunch grass, weeds, grain, hay, fences, house, barn and all or nearly all the timber on the premises."

Beal alleges that the contracting firm's negligence was responsible for the blaze. The fire started, he says, from heat and sparks thrown off by a steam shovel and blacksmith shop at the rock crushing plant. He further claims that Dunn and Baker not only refused to help fight the flames but were not equipped to do so had they been willing.

Beal asks statutory double damages of \$8000, estimating his actual loss at \$4000. J. H. Napier, plaintiff's attorney.

John Kenoffel, proprietor of the K cafe at 806 Klamath avenue, is plaintiff in the injunction suit, which names Culinary Alliance local 424 et al. as defendants. Kenoffel asserts that the alliance and its agents have interfered with his business in an attempt to force him to employ union labor and asks that they be restrained from picketing his establishment, assembling in the neighborhood or "any character of intimidation" affecting himself and his customers.

He also wants \$250 for damages already suffered and more if the alleged interference continues. Kenoffel is represented by J. C. O'Neill.

Work Advances on Implement Building

TULELAKE, July 31—Work is progressing rapidly on the large implement warehouse being built by Ray Alkens, Tulelake, and D. L. Jamison, Klamath Falls. When finished the building will be headquarters for Masey-Harris farm machinery.

The site is on the Southern Pacific right of way just north of a building occupied by E. L. Booth, also an implement dealer. Alkens is well known in Tulelake, having farmed here for a number of years and Jamison has been in business in Klamath Falls.

Suit Filed
Orson H. Beal versus Dunn and Baker. Plaintiff asks \$8000 double damages for \$4000 actual damage to plaintiff's real property adjoining defendant's rock crushing plant, resulting from a forest and brush fire June 24, 1936, and costs. Plaintiff claims that heat and sparks from defendant's steam shovel and blacksmith shop started the blaze and that defendant refused to aid in controlling the fire and was improperly equipped to do so. J. H. Napier, plaintiff's attorney.

Action Filed
John Kenoffel versus Culinary Alliance local 424 et al. Plaintiff asks decree restraining defendants and their agents from interfering with his restaurant business at 806 Klamath avenue, either by threats, picketing or any type of intimidation in an attempt to force plaintiff to employ union labor. Plaintiff also asks that defendants be restrained from assembling in the neighborhood of the building and that they be forced to pay \$250 damages to date and any further damages that may accrue. Plaintiff further asks that the restraining orders be made effective both during pendency of suit and permanently. J. C. O'Neill, plaintiff's attorney.

Paul Huyler sentenced to six months in the county jail for taking and using an automobile without permission of the owner. Huyler waived indictment and pleaded guilty to the charge after a more severe charge of larceny had been dismissed.

Two Injured in Farm Accidents

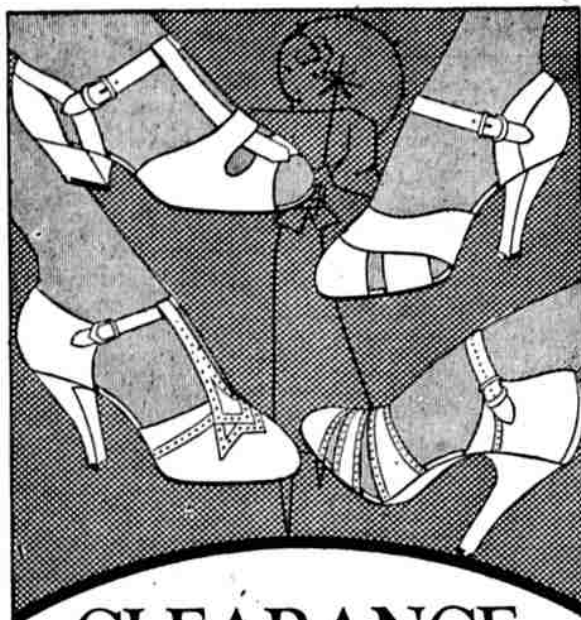
TULELAKE, July 31—Two accidents were reported by J. R. Barr this week.

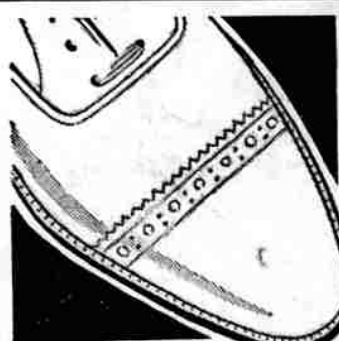
