Seeking Man—W. E. L. Harbour of Greeley, Colo., has asked the assistance of the local office of the national re-employment service in locating his son, W. Lloyd Harbour, who was last seen in Klamath Falls in the fall of 1935, according to a letter received by Jack Almeter, local manager. The missing man is 37 years old, 5 feet 7 inches to 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighs 225 pounds. He has thick brown hair, brown eyes and very even teeth. He may also be identified by a scar in the palm of his right hand and a tattoo of a sinking ship on his forearm. 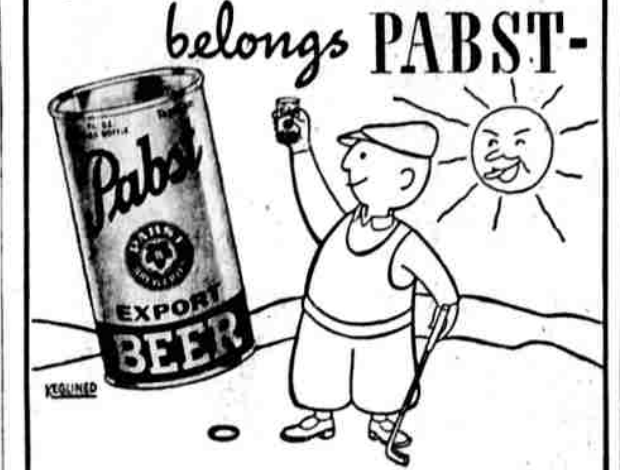
LONG-TIME LOCAL RESIDENT PASSES
