

EXCITED TRADING
OCCURS ON MART

CHICAGO, July 31 (AP)—Crop destruction both sides of the Atlantic resulted today in grain prices that in some cases outdid peaks unrecalled since 1929.

Wildly excited trading went along with higher prices, but heavy profit-taking developed at the last and quotations dropped sharply from extreme tops of about 4 cents each for wheat and corn. In wheat nearly all of today's gain was wiped out, but in corn, only about half.

Wheat closed flurried, 1-1/4 of a cent above yesterday's finish, Sept. \$1.10 1/2, Dec. \$1.11 1/2; corn 1 1/2-3/4 advanced, Sept. \$1.01 1/2, Dec. \$1.02 1/2; oats 1 1/4 up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 15 cents.

Ernest W. Peterson, religious editor of The Portland Journal, who will speak Sunday night at a union service of several Klamath Falls churches in the Methodist church.

Rev. John W. Warrell, pastor of Klamath Falls Methodist church, announces that Ernest W. Peterson, religious editor of the Portland Journal, will be guest speaker Sunday at 8 p. m. in his pulpit. The Presbyterian church has formally merged its service with the Methodists for this occasion, and other churches are expected to participate.

Peterson will answer the question, "Is Christianity Moving to the Right or to the Left?" His remarks will be a summary of his experiences in interviewing world religious leaders as they pass through Portland, and also on information gained through attendance at two recent church gatherings in the east.

Peterson was for 20 days in May at the Methodist general conference in Columbus, Ohio, and early this month was in Chicago for a week attending the annual meeting of the World Service commission of the Methodist church. Peterson was a lay delegate from Oregon to the general conference, and represents all of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska on the World Serv-

ice commission, which annually spends over \$3,000,000 of benevolent monies.

Peterson is speaking Sunday morning in Astoria and will motor across the mountains during the afternoon for the evening service here. He will be accompanied by his family.

The early part of the week, Peterson will spend visiting recreational areas in southern Oregon, including Crater Lake. In the interest of securing special travelogue material for his paper.
