MANY FEDERAL BONDS SOLD HERE

Sales of United States savings bonds in 1935 have increased 205 per cent over the monthly average for 1934 in Klamath Falls, figures compiled by Burt Hawkins, Klamath Falls postmaster, revealed Friday.

During the first six months of this year 271 bonds, with a total maturity value of \$57,575, have been sold here. This compares with 187 bonds having a total value of \$31,375 sold during the 10 months of 1934 that the bonds were available.

Breaking down the figures still further, the monthly average of sales during the January-June 30 period of 1935 was \$9562.50 as against a monthly average of \$3137.50 during the 10 months from March 1 to December 31, 1934, an increase of 205 per cent.

The "baby bonds" are available in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000 maturity value. The \$100 bonds have proved the most popular here both in 1935 when 69 were sold, and during the first half of this year when 91 were sold. Sales of the other denominations, according to Postmaster Hawkins' figures, are as follows:

On a national basis, average sales of the bonds have shown only a 50 per cent increase for the year 1935 over 1934. For the 10 months from March 1, 1935, until the end of the year, daily sales averaged approximately \$1,000,000. Purchases from January 1, 1935, to July 6 represent an average daily sale of approximately \$1,535,000. The bonds may be purchased at all postoffices of the first and second classes, at most of the third class and at some of the fourth class, or direct by mail from the treasurer of the United States or any federal reserve bank. They mature exactly 10 years from date of issue for a sum one-third more than the purchase price.
