THIS story is told by a visitor who has just arrived in Klamath Falls:

"I came up the coast by the Redwood highway, and at Crescent City turned inland to Grants Pass. I wanted to see the Klamath country, so at Grants Pass I inquired as to the best way to get here. "I was told: 'Are you sure you want to go to Klamath Falls? You know there's a desert between here and there.'"

WHY, what a nasty thing to say about Medford and Ashland!

THE subject of travel brings up naturally the subject of traffic—of which we're coming to have rather considerable here in the metropolis of the great interior country. Especially on Main street.

Perhaps a few observations, which are based on quite a little driving about the business district, might not be amiss here.

MAIN STREET traffic, in this thriving city of ours, moves at a speed that is often aggravatingly slow. If there were snails on the sidewalks, there would be times when people in cars out on the street could sit and watch them go whizzing by. (At least it seems that way when a fellow is in a hurry and gets caught in a slow-moving line of traffic.)

If traffic moved as slowly on Market street, down in the city, as it moves here, San Francisco people never would get anywhere.

THE trouble of course, lies not with everybody, but with a few abnormally slow drivers who go wandering down the street like a moon-struck young man out strolling with his best girl on Sunday evening and trying to put off getting home as long as possible.

These slow drivers pile up a line of traffic behind them. Everybody in this line is discommodated. If somebody gets impatient—

GIRL, SWEETHEART CONFESS MURDER

BAYONNE, N. J., Aug. 1 (AP)—Police Chief Cornelius J. O'Neill announced today Gladys MacKnight, 17, had confessed after all-night questioning, she killed her mother with a hatchet while her sweetheart held the mother's arms.

The girl and her sweetheart, Donald Wightman, were booked on murder charges, arraigned and held for the grand jury.

O'Neill quoted the girl as confessing she had quarreled with her mother, Mrs. Helen MacKnight, 47, chairman of a literary club, that Wightman seized the mother, who had a knife in her hand, and she hit the mother over the head with a hatchet.

Wightman, a chorister in a radio religious hour, confessed the slaying when he and the girl were arrested in flight, but later changed his story and accused her, police said.

PRISON TROUBLE NOT UNEXPECTED

PORTLAND, Aug. 1 (AP)—Two days before 700 convicts in the state prison rioted, a former inmate being deported to England, predicted "hell would blow" at the penitentiary, it was recalled here today.

Frederick W. Pearce, being taken to England, said the prisoners were in an ugly mood and were prepared to cause trouble if a court refused to permit automatic releases of convicts after they had served minimum sentences, less good behavior time credits.

New Rebel Troops Ready for Drive On Capital City

Brightly Clad Gypsies Camp at Courthouse

Klamath county courthouse grounds were turned into a gypsy camp Saturday afternoon, when 47 brightly clad Romanies were detained by state police officers on charges of setting forest fires in the northern part of the county.

The gypsies were met at Rabbit Flats by state police after Chief Ranger Burgess of Crescent reported that the band had started five forest fires in the Crescent and Odell lake areas by leaving burning camp fires behind them. Burgess was expected to arrive here later in the day to sign a complaint.

While their elders argued with law enforcement officers, scantily clad brown-skinned children frolicked in the sprinkling system on the courthouse lawn, as several hundred amused citizens and courthouse employees looked on.

There were six automobiles in the gypsy caravan, and heads of the four families represented gave their homes as Nebraska, Iowa, Montana and South Dakota, respectively.

FRANCE PURSUES NEUTRAL COURSE

Grave Concern Felt Over
International Effects
Of Civil War

PARIS, Aug. 1 (AP)—France's socialist government determined to pursue a middle-of-the-road policy in respect to Spain's civil war, today announced French volunteers may fight across the border but must not carry arms on French soil.

Disturbed by the possibility of international repercussions from the flight of Italian airplanes to Spanish Morocco, the French cabinet held a prolonged discussion on the question of French nationals fighting in Spain.

Fresh indications were at hand that Blum's government was gravely concerned over the airplane incident. Members of the cabinet hinted that Paris was conferring with Rome and perhaps Madrid and other capitals on the question.

Official alarm over the Spanish revolution mounted as political circles, including some rightist quarters previously sympathetic to the rebels, were reported.

ITALIAN FLIERS PRIVATELY PAID

RABAT, French Morocco, Aug. 1 (AP)—Italian fliers seized in French Morocco when they were forced down ostensibly during a flight to rebel headquarters in Spanish Morocco were delivering supplies from a private Italian company, their chief pilot was quoted today as saying.

The flier quoted, a Captain Gilbert, admitted they were part of an expedition financed by a private Italian concern to deliver supplies to the rebel army in Spanish Morocco, dominated by Gen. Francisco Franco, chief of the rebel forces.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 1 (AP) Ben B. Laake, Denver attorney, left for Leavenworth penitentiary today to serve ten years for taking part of the \$200,000 Charles F. Ulrich ransom as a fee for defending one of the millionaire oil man's abductors.

"I'm trading a name for a number," Laake said as he surrendered to U. S. Marshal W. C. Geers.

HOPES FOR PEACE DECLARED REMOTE

Loyal Army Continues To
Advance On Fascist
Stronghold

ROBLEGORDO, Spain, (with General Emilio Mola's rebel army) Aug. 1 (AP)—Reinforcements of troops and fascist militia poured into Roblegordo today to speed up the rebel advance on Madrid.

The armed movement began at midnight, with long truck caravans rumbling over the shell-torn roads bringing fighters for the final attack on Buitrago, 46 miles north of the capital.

Cold Sweeps Passes
The rebel soldiers, riding in stock trucks, huddled beneath blankets to protect themselves from the bitter cold on the windswept heights of Guadarrama mountain passes.

Campfires dotted the darkness as the insurgents paused temporarily to prepare the traditional Spanish drink—coffee and hot milk—before going into battle.

The popular highway to Madrid through the Somo Sierra pass was cluttered with wrecked trucks and buses—shattered evidence of the good aim of machine gunning loyal aviators.

Peace Held Remote
Thick smoke hung over the mountain villages as huge piles of dead artillery horses were burned.

The chugging of military conveyances and the rattle of gun carriages was broken by frequent shouts of "viva Espana!" constituting the inevitable greeting of rebel soldiers to their officers.

Rebel officers admitted it will be a long time before real order is restored in Spain.

Sixteen thousand soldiers and militiamen were used to storm (Continued on Page Ten)

FIVE MEET DEATH IN FLORIDA STORM

VALPARAISO, Fla., Aug. 1 (AP)—A tropical storm charged with at least five deaths, itself out in southern Alabama today.

Coast guardsmen searched still tumbling gulf waters for the fishing schooner Sea Gull, unreported since she left Tampa July 25 for the Dry Tortugas. The Sea Gull also had five aboard.

The auxiliary schooner Ketchikan of St. Petersburg, with an undetermined number on board, was off the northwest Florida coast when the hurricane hit yesterday and was unreported to day.

A number of Florida communities found the damage relatively light in view of the hurricane's force.

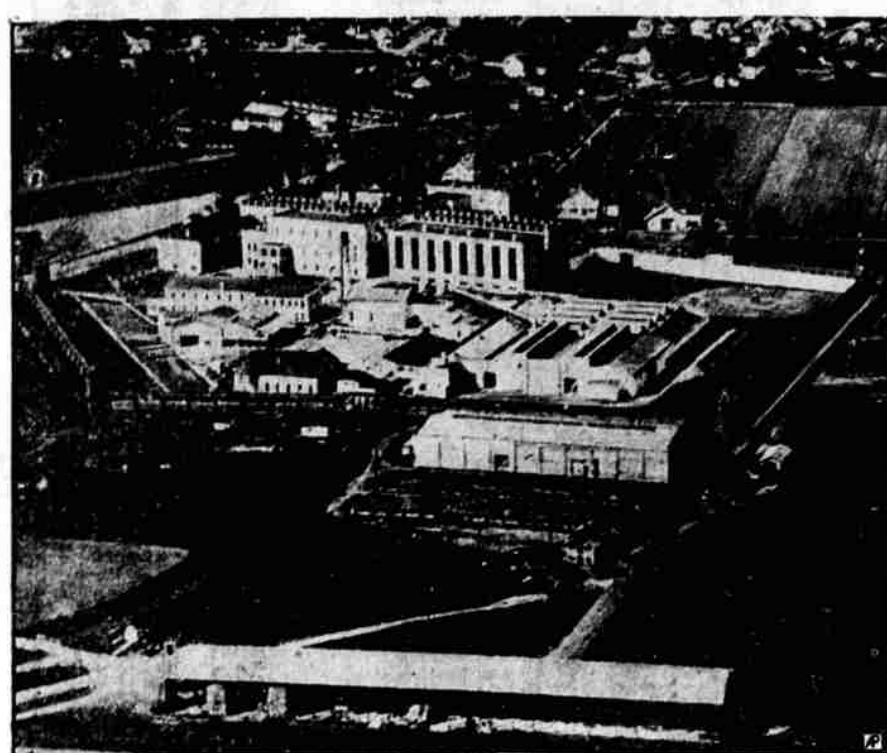

The man emptied his pistol at Inspector James English before he was brought down by Patrolman Rudolph Kopfer. In his pockets was found \$107 in cash and a receipt for \$10 issued at San Quentin prison today.

CHANCELLOR OPENS BERLIN OLYMPICS

Americans, British And
French Avoid Use
Of Nazi Salute

BERLIN, August 1 (AP)—An overflow crowd of 105,000 spectators packed the main stadium today as Chancellor Hitler arrived at the Reichsportfeld to declare the 11th Olympic games formally opened.

The huge crowd, unmindful of a heavy downpour, roared a greeting and gave the Nazi salute.

Flanked by Dr. Theodor Le-wald of the German organizing committee, and Count Henri Baillet-Latour, president of the International Olympic committee, the chancellor smiled and returned the crowd's repeated "heils" as the formal ceremonies were opened.

Then began the parade of nations with Greece leading the colorful procession. S. Louis, Greekian winner of the 1896 Olympic marathon title, marched at the head of the Greek delegation which evoked tremendous cheers as it dipped its flag and gave the Nazi salute.

Preceded by a wholesale withdrawal of Brazilian athletes following the South American's failure to settle factional differences, the formal opening of the 11th Olympiad were marred by intermittent showers.

Overnight the Americans, ostensibly motivated by a desire to avoid giving the equivalent of (Continued on Page Five)

Associated Press Reporter Gives Eye-witness Story of Prison Disorder

SALEM, Aug. 1 (AP)—Things happened so fast within Oregon's penitentiary walls yesterday when 700 howling and frenzied convicts hurled defiance at prison guards and Warden James Lewis that I am still dazed at what I saw.

Food Taken from Commissary
I stood in the yard near the commissary and watched hundreds of prisoners, under orders from a youth waving a megaphone, carry food and tobacco to the far end of the grounds. They milled around the yard, the chapel or reception room, in and out of the cell blocks, ignoring unarmed guards who helplessly watched the proceedings.

Many of them yelling for the sheer enjoyment of making a noise and others shouting profane epithets at officials and guards, the convicts took complete possession of the institution up to the turnkey's post. And they were a grim, hot and threatening looking gang.

"Let's Make a Run"
The youth with the megaphone then ordered all the men to the island (the recreational ground) where the tenseness indicated other things were being planned. Suddenly it happened.

There was a yell.
"Come on guys—let's make a run for it!"

The prison guards on the walls, however, were ready. Several score men dashed toward tower No. 6 and as they crossed the "dead-line" there was a shot and I saw a man in the center of the group fall and roll over, screaming.

I didn't wait any longer. I dashed back into the chapel and heard two more shots, coming from another direction, and two more convicts fell. Turning I saw men run in every direction seeking what cover they could. The shouts of the leaders were drowned out.

Guards in Action
There was a momentary lull and the dash for freedom checked. Some of the convicts picked up the wounded and started for the hospital which entrance was through the chapel.

Then it broke out again and an angry mob started for the chapel. The guards sprang into action and threatened more firing if any but those carrying the wounded entered. They stopped long enough for the (Continued on Page Five)

SHIRLEY TEMPLE PLOT DISCOVERED

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., Aug. 1 (AP)—Sterling W. Powell, 16-year-old farm boy charged with attempting to extort \$25,000 from the father of Shirley Temple, child actress, today pleaded guilty and waived preliminary hearing when he was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner A. F. Streitz here.

Streitz set bond for the youth at \$1000 and bound him over to the federal district court for trial at the next term here, which starts June 8, 1937.

Friends of the boy hoped to arrange the bond and obtain his release from jail.

The prisoner readily admitted he had sent a letter to George F. Temple, father of the little actress, setting forth in part: "Unless \$25,000 is dropped from an airplane near Grant, Neb., on May 15, the life of Shirley Temple will be endangered."

COUSINS DROWN
COLUSA, Calif., Aug. 1 (AP)—Officials dragged the Sacramento river for the body of Miss Marie Stowell, 20, Colusa, after recovery of her 11-year-old cousin, June Stowell, Los Angeles.

Oregon Convicts Scream Defiance; All Food Stopped

Warden Orders Starvation Treatment After
Unsuccessful Break Friday Night;
Bend Murderer Loses Life

SALEM, Aug. 1 (AP)—Neither truce nor armistice, but continued screaming to the accompaniment of shattering window panes settled over the Oregon penitentiary today as more than 700 prisoners were being starved into submission following the fatal riot late yesterday in an unsuccessful break for freedom.

Tear Gas Guns Ready
Guards with small tear gas guns paraded before the cells in an effort to still the defiance of rioters who were kept in locked quarters where they sullenly retreated last night under leveled rifles and giant gas guns.

One prisoner paid with his life in the maddened attempt to rush the walls, another was critically wounded and a third was in the hospital with a shot through the hand from gun fire from guards. State police details remained at the penitentiary to aid the gray-haired and square-jawed warden, James Lewis. They will remain until after complete order has been restored and the prisoners permitted to file into the dining room—perhaps tonight.

Despite cries of "give us food," Lewis said emphatically there would be no lunch—and nothing to eat until the convicts were ready to go to work.

No food has been served since noon Friday.

An inquest was ordered for Monday, as a matter of formality, to place the direct cause of the riot which followed word that the circuit court had upheld an attorney general's opinion barring automatic releases from the prison at the expiration of minimum sentences.

Body Not Claimed
The 12 jury leaders of the riot were confined to the bull pen, including Frank Tilson the self-appointed commander, and Gaylord Sorahan, his chief lieutenant.

Relatives of Thomas Baughn, the 59-year-old Bend murderer who was slain in the break attempt, refused to claim the body and Warden Lewis announced it would be cremated after the inquest. James Hamilton, 36, serving life for a 1926 slaying, suffered a gun shot wound through the lung; while Joseph DuPrey, 24, serving two years for burglary in Portland, was in the hospital with a crippled hand.

Montana Fire Eats
Into Green Forests

HAVRE, Mont., Aug. 1 (AP)—Fanned by strong winds, the Mission canyon forest fire which has caused evacuation of three mining camps and an Indian mission ate deeper into the green forests of the Little Rockies mountain range southeast of here today.

Wary fire crews continued their stubborn fight to check the red wave which has devoured 30,000 acres of timber, burned three men to death and cut a path four miles wide through the Lewis and Clark national forest since Wednesday.

AMERICAN FIRMS SEIZED IN SPAIN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Seizure of American automobile plants in Barcelona by the "fascist" central committee for Catalonia" was confirmed in a message received by the state department today.
