GREAT POWERS TO TAKE STAND ON NEUTRALITY

PARIS, Aug. 1 (UP)—Diplomatic conversations between Paris, Berlin, London and Rome to establish a common attitude of neutrality regarding the Spanish civil war were in prospect Friday.

Major European governments followed closely the situation created by the crash in French north Africa of Italian bombing planes intended for Spanish rebels in Spanish Morocco.

In French foreign office circles it was indicated that the French popular government would take the initiative in the projected diplomatic conversations.

Communist Applauded

Meanwhile demands for strict French neutrality in the Spanish civil war and communist attacks on Germany and Italy for alleged aid to Spanish insurgents were shouted during foreign affairs debate in the French chamber of deputies.

During the debate Premier Leon Blum, head of the popular front, joined the socialist and communist deputies in applauding Gabriel Peri, communist, who attacked Germany and Italy.

"We must encourage democracy in hours of trial such as are being endured by the young Spanish republic," Peri said, "in the interests of France and peace our sympathy and solidarity should be extended."

Policy Revision Urged

Previously Paul Reynaud, former cabinet minister, demanded complete revision of French military, economic and monetary policies as an indispensable basis for a strong foreign policy.

Without mentioning Italy, Reynaud referred to regrettable incidents of yesterday the crash of Italian armed planes in French Morocco while en route to rebels in Spanish Morocco, and insisted that the government make its stand clear on the Spanish civil war. But he demanded a policy of strict neutrality.

The Nazi salute, changed plans for their part in the parade of the athletes of 32 nations before Chancellor Adolf Hitler.

Instead of extending their right arms outward at an upward angle with their hats in their hands, they decided instead to hold their hats over their heads, then give an "eyes right" salute at a given command while passing in review behind the flag-bearer, Alfred Jochims, veteran Union City, N. J., gymnast.

The British, following the French, evoked only mild cheers as they marched past, giving only "eyes right." The Italians, smartly garbed in white trousers or skirts, the leaders black-shirted and the others, blue-shirted, lifted their hands in the fascist salute.

The Japanese leaders gave the military salute as the athletes gave "eyes right." The Canadians, attired in bright red coats and white trousers, were given an ovation after saluting in Nazi fashion.

A big Austrian team of 200 around another outburst of Nazi saluting although a dozen officers gave only the military salute. The significance was quickly marked, inasmuch as until the recent Austro-German accord, it was a prison offense in Austria to give the Nazi salute.

doors to be closed behind the injured.

There were more murmurings and I saw the reason. On the walls stood 20 booted state policemen. They said nothing but in their hands they carried tear gas guns—and the convicts knew it—they knew too what the police intended to do.

The shouting quieted down and uneasy men milled around the island. Unarmed guards were skirting the mob talking quietly to the men. Attempts of the leaders to renew their efforts met with little response. The convicts appeared beaten.

The usual signals for the line-up to parade into the prison were given. The prisoners forgot their threats to stay out all night.

Suddenly, but without resistance, the convicts fell into line and with folded arms, loaded with groceries and tobacco, with various weapons in their pockets, marched into the cell block.

With a start I noticed the yard was empty, calm appearing as on many other occasions I had seen it. It seemed haunting that where a moment ago 700 yelling men, many in a vicious mood, stood and where one of them had been killed, that quiet now prevailed and only the grim walls of the prison showed.

It seemed like a bad dream.

sented as believing that Premier Mussolini and Chancellor Hitler might be with the background of the fascist movement in Spain.

Reliable sources pointed to two possibilities for Italian and German interest in the rebellion: 1. Mussolini might agree to aid the rebels in return for promised concessions in north Africa which would assist Italy's expansion in the Mediterranean.

2. Hitler might be linked to the agreement through cooperation with Mussolini—a supposition bolstered, these sources asserted, by the pre-revolution visit to Berlin of General Jose Sanjurjo, Spanish monarchist.
