In these days of the lively ball, infielders seldom get their hands on one hit more than two or three steps to either side of them.

But Crosetti beats the jackrabbit pellet with uncanny anticipation. No shortstop ever turned in a better job of calling the batter's shots.

Hiters generally hit different pitchers and deliveries in different directions. Crosetti has made a close study of the possibilities with the result that he has put a dent in the old axiom that you can't outsmart a base hit.

Crosetti throws out runners from deep short, getting the ball away fast enough to beat out even the sprinter. When he first broke into the American league in 1932, he went much farther to his left than his right, but now goes both ways equally well.
