On Sunday, however, fines were paid and the wanderers departed. The News-Herald photographer, seeking pictures of the exotic gathering, found the males of the tribe willing to pose while the womenfolk unanimously shunned the camera as if it were poison. 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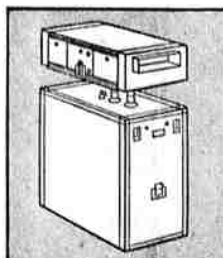
