

CITY BRIEFS

Program Announced—The Cotton Blossom chorus from the Piney Woods school at Piney Woods, Mississippi, will give a program of spirituals, plantation melodies, and dialect readings at the First Christian church on Tuesday evening, August 4, at 8 o'clock. These colored singers are touring the west, and are appearing in all of the larger cities. They are highly trained and gifted singers who will please their audience. There will be no admission charge but a collection will be taken at the close of the program.

Diseases Reported—Forty-eight cases of communicable diseases were reported to the Klamath county health unit during July by county physicians, according to the monthly report forwarded to the state board of health. The diseases were listed as follows: infantile paralysis, 3; scarlet fever, 2; erysipelas, 3; whooping cough, 9; bronchial pneumonia, 1; measles, 8; typhoid fever, 5; tick fever, 1; tubercular meningitis, 1. A total of 149 office conferences were given by Dr. Neil Black, county physician, and Lydia Fricke, public health nurse.

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MANY MISHAPS OCCUR HERE OVER WEEKEND

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ARMY OFFICER HERE THIS WEEK

News of Oregon

SALEM, Aug. 3 (AP)—There was one prisoner in the Oregon penitentiary who got food while 799 other convicts starved because of their defiance of prison rules.

He was Calvin Judy, who has served more than 45 years on a Douglas county murder charge. A guard gave the old man milk and bread. He took no part in the attempted escape of Friday.

"The old man is fussy and has no use for other convicts," Warden James Lewis said.

MARSHFIELD, Aug. 3 (AP)—

Log splashing, damming of streams and commercial fishing enterprises threaten the beauty and natural fish resources of Oregon's waters, the Oregon Izaak Walton league asserted at its annual convention here.

The league supported a resolution calling upon the public utilities commissioner to refuse a franchise to a company which was charged with damaging the South Coos river by log splashing.

William L. Finley, national vice-president of the league, called for action to combat interests seeking to dam streams for power and other purposes. He charged that in building Bonneville dam, Oregon was trading the finest salmon stream in the country for power. He also expressed opposition to plans for further damming of the Columbia to create an inland waterways system.

EUGENE, Aug. 3 (AP)—Murder and suicide ended an argument between two well known men here, Jess Lowman, about 50, and Jack Vaughan, 55.

H. J. Downing, Lowell storekeeper, told state police that Vaughan entered the store Saturday and engaged in an argument with Lowman, at the climax to which Vaughan fired five shots into Lowman's body.

State police were summoned and found Vaughan in the back yard of his home, the top of his head blown off with a .30-30 rifle. Police said Vaughan apparently had been worked into an emotional state through a family matter.
