Bang's Disease Test Work Nears Finish

Testing for Bang's disease is now in its final stages in the Klamath basin, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson, with approximately 2500 head of cows tested to date.

It will be necessary for all livestock owners who desire to have their cows tested to make application at the county agent's office in the near future.

Agreements with the United States bureau of animal industry must be signed before the test is undertaken, and these blanks are now available at the county agent's office.

No further applications can be received after final schedules for the last week's work are prepared and mailed to headquarters, the county agent stated.

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SOAP BOX DERBY PLANS ANNOUNCED

Klamath Falls' second soap box derby, sponsored by the Lost River dairy and Locke Motor company, will be held this year on September 4, and youngsters wishing to enter the competition are urged to get in their entries at once.

ANYWAY, you have here the two viewpoints—the optimistic and the not so optimistic. If you will study them carefully, you ought to be able to draw your OWN conclusions.
