WHEAT HARVEST IN EUROPE REPORTED

CHICAGO, Aug. 5 (AP)—Stimulated by European reports of wet harvest conditions and of critical aspects of political affairs, wheat became the market leader today, advancing sharply.

Winnipeg and Minneapolis led the upturn of prices. St. Louis was given to reports that wheat production in the world over now is less than the amount needed for normal use, let alone, emergency.

Wheat closed strong, 13-32 cents above yesterday's finish. Sept. 1.13 1/4, Dec. 1.14 1/4; corn irregular, 12 off to 4 up, Sept. 1.06 1/2, Dec. 94 1/2; oats unchanged to 1/2 higher, and provisions unchanged to 20 cents decline.

PORTLAND, Aug. 5 (AP)—After several years of higher than export prices, the Pacific northwest wheat market today found itself on a basis permitting general bidding by Europe. Reports in the trade, of the sale of a couple of cargoes and some parcels to Europe could not be confirmed.

Both the United Kingdom and Ireland were reported as buyers of wheat here.

The entire wheat structure turned strong. On the futures market September closed 1c, December 1 1/2c and May 1 1/2c higher. On the sample cash market local wheat gained 2 1/2c, with Montana 3 1/2c higher.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—The stock market today cast off the influence of early selling in the motors and aircraft and crept up from its lows with the aid of a good demand for specialties.

In the losing column with declines of fractions to a point or more were Chrysler, General Motors, Auburn, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, International Harvester, Du Pont, American Can, Goodyear, New York Central and Pennsylvania.

Zenith Radio dropped more than three points in fairly brisk trading.

Among the session's most active issues and fractions to a point or so higher were Gabriel, U. S. Pipe & Foundry, Canada Dry, Allis-Chalmers and Budd Manufacturing. On limited volume Allied Chemical jumped seven points.

Rails enjoyed the stimulus of expanding freight carloadings. Union Pacific was up more than two points on modest turnover. Tilting forward moderately were Santa Fe, Delaware & Hudson and Great Northern preferred.

American Telephone rose about a point. Utilities were mixed. Demand for Consolidated Edison and North American contrasted with pressure on Western Union and Public Service of New Jersey.
