

FUN WILL BE MAIN FEATURE FOR GRANGERS

The Klamath-Lake county grange picnic scheduled for Saturday evening and all day Sunday, August 8 and 9, is to be crowded from the beginning with fun and more fun, according to a program being worked out by officers of the Klamath and Lake county Pomona granges.

From the 20 grange organizations of the two counties grangers and their families and friends will assemble Saturday evening with their camp equipment prepared to camp over night. Not only from the granges of the two counties but from all over the state men and women prominent in grange work and public affairs will be present. Pomona Master L. Alva Lewis announces that Congressman Walter M. Pierce will be there and will speak Saturday evening as well as at the Pomona session during the day, while his opponent at the November election, Roy Rittner, will be on the program Sunday. Frank Jenkins, editor of the Klamath News and Herald is scheduled to speak Sunday.

There will be a camp fire program Saturday evening with music, singing and games. On Sunday morning the fun will start early with contests between the Klamath and Lake county grangers. During the day there will be a hog calling contest with Merle Loosley in charge. Merle has a record, if rumors are to be credited, of being able to call a hog from Merrill to Malin in eight minutes.

Then there will be a chicken calling contest with Lester Schreiner in charge. All grangers know Lester and his fondness for chickens, especially pullets. When he calls they simply can't resist.

Earl Mack will be in charge of the husband calling contest and is laying elaborate plans to insure the response of only one husband for each wife who calls. He says he has received inquiries for rules of the contest from old maids living all over the west. The rules, he states, are to be "catch as catch can."

There will be tugs of war between Klamath and Lake county grangers. A horseshoe pitching contest in which A. G. Morrison expects to bring the championship to Klamath providing he can also bring the scalp of Milton Hamersley, the champion horseshoe pitcher of Lake county. A baseball game between grangers of Klamath and Lake counties was originally on the program but Henry Anderson hasn't been able to find a sidehill baseball which will be necessary as there is no level ground in Booth park for a baseball diamond.

There will be eats and more eats such as only a grange picnic will provide. Every granger will bring a lunch basket. The Pomona granges will furnish the ice cream, coffee, etc.

An orchestra is coming from Lakeview as is also a male quartet. The drill team contest between drill teams of the various subordinate granges will be held in the afternoon for prizes voted by the Pomona granges.

The Klamath grangers will attend the Pomona grange session at Bly Saturday and from there will drive direct to the picnic grounds.

Roy Rittner of Pendleton, republican candidate for congressional district will be in Lake county Saturday and Sunday, August 8 and 9 for the purpose of attending the Klamath-Lake county grange picnic to be held at Booth park. Rittner is on the program as speaker on Sunday afternoon.

Congressman Walter M. Pierce, Rittner's opponent, will also be a speaker at the picnic Saturday evening and also at the Pomona session at Bly.

Hamersley Family to Hold Reunion At Klamath Falls

Hamersleys from here and you will find their devious ways to Klamath Falls this weekend, August 8 and 9 to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the coming of the "Hams" to Oregon.

Bill, Andy and George, with their families, said goodbye to fathers, mothers, sisters and brothers in the spring of '61 and headed their prairie schooners westward over the Oregon Trail. Few of those left behind were ever seen again. Solomon and Jacob came out to join the brothers in 1872. The three brothers and their families made it to the Willamette valley for the winter of '61 but the spring of '62 found Bill and Andy on their way to Lake county in southeastern Oregon.

Southern Oregon in the early sixties was not a bed of roses. The Indians were either bad or dead. There were no roads, no means of communication, just wide-open spaces where nobody ever went and dogs barked at strangers.

"Go west young man and grow up with the country" might have been good advice then but who'd take it now. Imagine saying to a youngster of 21 today "Take yourself a wife, a span of mules, a gun, a dog, a crosscut saw, a choppin' ax, a broad ax and a fro, and go out there on yon side of them thar hills and hew out yourself a home." The answer would probably be, there ain't no gas in dad's old geology, it won't make the hills on high nohow, the handle is out of the ax, I wouldn't know a fro from nuthin', it's just a lot of hard work and I'd rather sit here and wait for the Townsend old age pension.

Bill, Andy, Jake, Sol and George Hamersley were cast in a die of another day and of different material. They had behind them a long line of ancestors who were always out in front from the beginning of the name Hamersley back in 1368.

The lord mayor of London in 1627 was a Hamersley. His work was outstanding. A monument was erected in his honor in London and his picture and coat of arms can still be seen in Guild Hall.

William Hamersley, a British sea captain, is the first of the name on record to come to this country. He came to New York in 1732 and became active in social, political and commercial pursuits. His grave stone can be seen from the sidewalk on Fifth avenue in the little church yard

at the upper end of Wall street. William Hamersley died in 1751. From the William Hamersley family and many more families who came later from England, the family name spread as the country was opened up for settlement, to Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Missouri, Iowa and finally in 1861 to Oregon.

Mrs. Mabel Horton, daughter of Alice Hamersley Tharp, will preside over this year's gathering. Ray Roy Hamersley, grandson of William, will act as scribe. Some of those "Hams" who have declared their intentions of being on hand at Klamath Falls are Joe and Tom Portland, Luther of San Francisco, Lawrence of Puerto, LeRoy of Pomona, Ada Shirlock of Los Angeles, and Ray Roy of Reno, Nev.

REV. A. C. BATES TO REMAIN HERE

Some time ago Arthur Charles Bates, minister of the First Christian church, received a call to take the pastorate of the Christian church at Dallas, Ore. After considering the matter for some time, and upon the urgent request of the congregation here, he announced Sunday that he had decided to remain in Klamath Falls.

Rev. Bates has served the First Christian church for the past three years and seven months, coming here from Mill City, Ore., in January, 1933. During this time the church has made much progress. One hundred and sixty-six new members have been added to the rolls. The church indebtedness has been reduced to the amount of \$4000. This is in addition to carrying all of the current expenses of the church.

Beginning with December, 1933, the congregation discarded the passing of the collection plates, and since that time has received all money through boxes placed at the doors for the tithes and offerings of the members. There has been no solicitation for pledges, no money raising campaigns, but the church has been going forward in splendid way with the newly adopted financial policy, its officials say. The matter of the tithe has been stressed in Rev. Bates' preaching, and the church has a goodly number of consistent and consecrated tithers.

PARK CABINS MAY BE USED NEXT WINTER

David Canfield, superintendent of Crater Lake national park, on a visit to Klamath Falls Wednesday, said that possibly arrangements can be made for accommodations for winter visitors in the park the coming year.

Canfield said that a tentative plan has been discussed whereby cabins in the rim area could be made available on a winter rent basis, for southern Oregonians who would want to visit the park occasionally during the winter months.

Under this plan, an individual or group would rent a cabin for the winter months at \$10 a month, or \$60 for the season. There are 22 cabins, and if assurances can be had that they will be taken by Klamath Falls, Medford, and other groups, the plan can probably be put into effect.

Each cabin has a double bed and a small cook-stove. Other sleeping accommodations would

be provided by the group leasing the cabin. Canfield said that the park service now has two plans, which assure that the roads will be open to the rim area throughout the winter. Those who take winter cabins can be assured that they will be able to reach them. It is important for the park service to know before fall what definite arrangements can be made. Inquiry by interested persons may be made at the chamber of commerce or of officials of the Klamath Snow clan.
