

CRATER LAKE TRAVEL MARK HITS NEW HIGH

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Aug. 6 (Special)—July, with the arrival of 54,010 people in 15,378 cars, set a new Crater lake travel record, and brought the season total to the 100,000 mark approximately six weeks earlier than last year.

The percentage of increase over July, 1935, is 270 per cent more first entry cars and 154 per cent more recent cars, while the increase over June is 152 per cent more cars and 169 per cent more people.

The actual increase of 1936 over 1935 is 13,942 cars, 56 per cent, and 44,197 people or 85 per cent. Travel by stage increased by 182 people over last year, or 61 per cent. Every state in the union was represented during the month at the Annie Spring checking station, junction of the south and west entrance roads.

Travel has been so consistently heavy that reservations are advised for accommodations at the Crater lake lodge and cabins, if certain types of accommodations are desired.

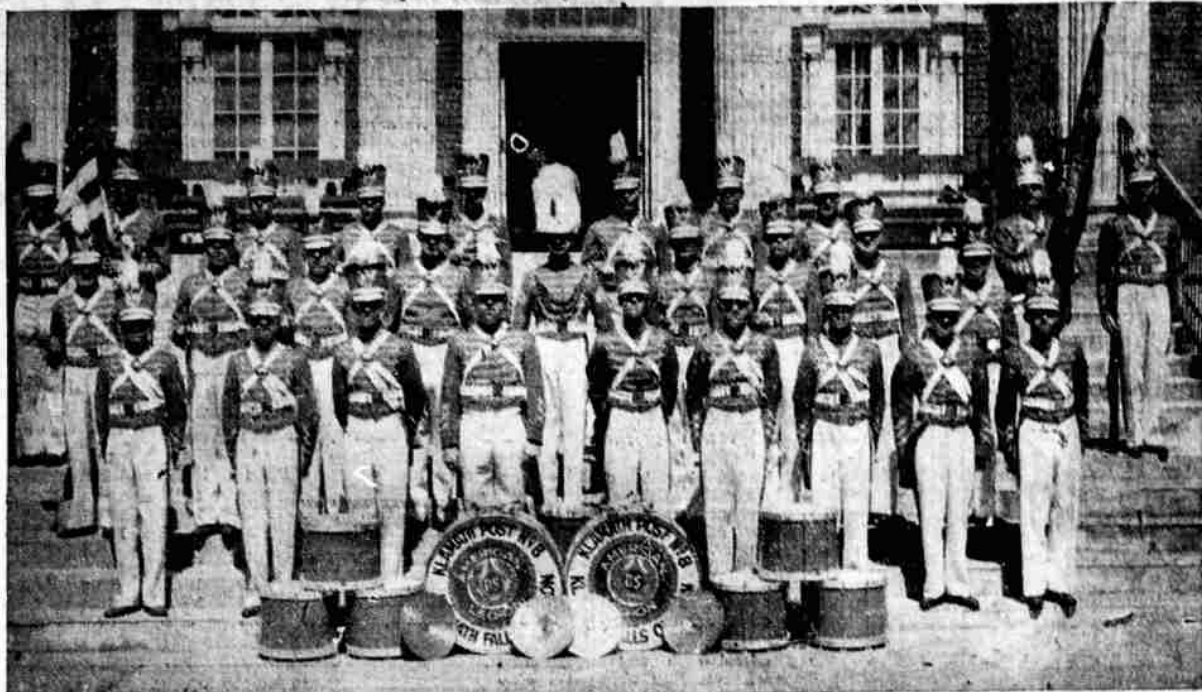

Chain Stores to Aid Beef Growers

An appeal to Safeway Stores, Inc., and other chain food stores of the nation to aid in the marketing of beef in the interests of cattle raisers throughout the United States has just been issued by the National Livestock and Meat board and other livestock associations. It was announced here today.

Responding to this call for distribution assistance, Safeway officials have revealed that they will wage an aggressive farmer-consumer campaign during August to aid in stimulating a greater consumption of beef throughout the country.

Similar in scope and magnitude to the recent successful peach campaign conducted by chain stores, this new sales program for beef will be of direct benefit to more than 6,000,000 cattlemen in all parts of the nation. T. M. Medford, Safeway district manager for Klamath Falls, declared.

Joining the National Livestock and Meat board in the request for distribution assistance were the National Livestock Marketing association, American National Livestock association, and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association.

It was pointed out by officials of these cattle organizations that unless beef consumption is immediately stimulated the industry faces an enormous financial loss.

ALAMEDA AIRPORT, Alameda, Cal., Aug. 6 (UP)—Dissatisfied with the performance of his plane on the first leg of a projected Los Angeles-to-Moscow flight, Sigismund Levanesky, foremost aviator of the soviet republic, indicated tonight he may abandon the proposed flight within the next few days.

Levanesky expressed his dissatisfaction when he and Victor Levenchenko, his flying companion, climbed from the single motored seaplane on its arrival at the Alameda airport this afternoon.

"We have had much minor trouble and I have not made up my mind entirely to go through with the project," he said. "We will decide when we have covered one-third of the flight."

INQUEST DELAYED IN ACCIDENT CASE

Inquest into the death of the hitch-hiker who died as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident after he was given a lift by Clyde L. Hartshorn of Merrill has been postponed until 9:00 o'clock Friday morning at the Earl Whitlock funeral home, according to an announcement from Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner.

Identity of the man has not yet been definitely established, but it is believed that he was Damien Redmond, about 40, a world war veteran, who was en route to Klamath Falls to receive bonus bonds.

The accident occurred Tuesday evening near the Lost River bridge on the Dallas-California highway, when Hartshorn's machine and an automobile driven by Delbert Hutcherson crashed together.

The accident victim died at a local hospital Wednesday morning, and an autopsy to determine cause of death was performed later in the day.
