SCANDAL HITS GAS INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (UP)—With 84 individual and corporate gasoline industry leaders already under indictment, Attorney General Homer S. Cummings today revealed that the federal government is pushing inquiry into alleged gasoline price fixing in several sections of the country.

Cummings said the federal grand jury at Madison, Wis., which handed down criminal indictments against many of the most famous individual leaders and 12 corporate corporations in the gasoline industry, would reconvene on August 19 to continue its investigations.

Officers, meanwhile, believed the investigations were merely a single phase of a vigorous anti-trust drive by the justice department toward stricter enforcement of anti-trust laws.

Cummings admitted that several investigations of entirely separate industries are being conducted by the department and the federal trade commission. One inquiry concerns alleged collective and identical bidding on government purchasing contracts.

Anti-Picketing Order Accepted In Idaho Strike

PIERRE, Idaho, Aug. 6 (UP)—Pickets in the Clearwater county lumber strike area accepted peacefully today the order of Col. F. C. Hummel to stop picketing in large numbers, and interfering with persons wishing to pass their lines.

Col. Hummel, commanding the national guard in the martial law area, hoped the move would stop a series of violence which was climaxed by a clash between strikebreakers and pickets last Sunday, in which five men were shot and several beaten. The strikers maintained a nominal picket line of six men. Col. Hummel said his troops would not stop peaceful, nominal picketing, but would stand for no interference with traffic or intimidation of workers.

Condition of victims of the gun battle Sunday were improving, hospital attaches said.

The county jail at Orofino was crowded with 17 prisoners, all held without charge in connection with the riot.

CHARGE FILED AFTER TRUCK INVADERS YARD

Other police court cases were listed Thursday as follows by the judge: Joe McManus, \$10 or five days in jail on charges of disorderly conduct, and bail of \$5 each forfeited by Joe Fales and William Norton who were charged with leaving trash in an alley.

FARM CRISIS MORE ACUTE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (UP)—The current drought was labeled Wednesday by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, as the worst in the history of this country.

Wallace drew this conclusion on the basis of a report from the United States weather bureau.

The secretary, however, offered farmers in the heat belt some hope by saying that prospects for rain were better than they had been all summer. Rain, even this late, he added, will save some of the corn crop.

Meanwhile, the United States bureau of biological survey entered the ranks of drought relief agencies when it announced plans to employ 4000 impoverished farmers in building 51 refuges for waterfowl and other wild life. An allotment of \$600,000 has been obtained from federal emergency relief funds for this purpose. The projects will be carried out in nine states: North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Michigan, Oklahoma and Wyoming.

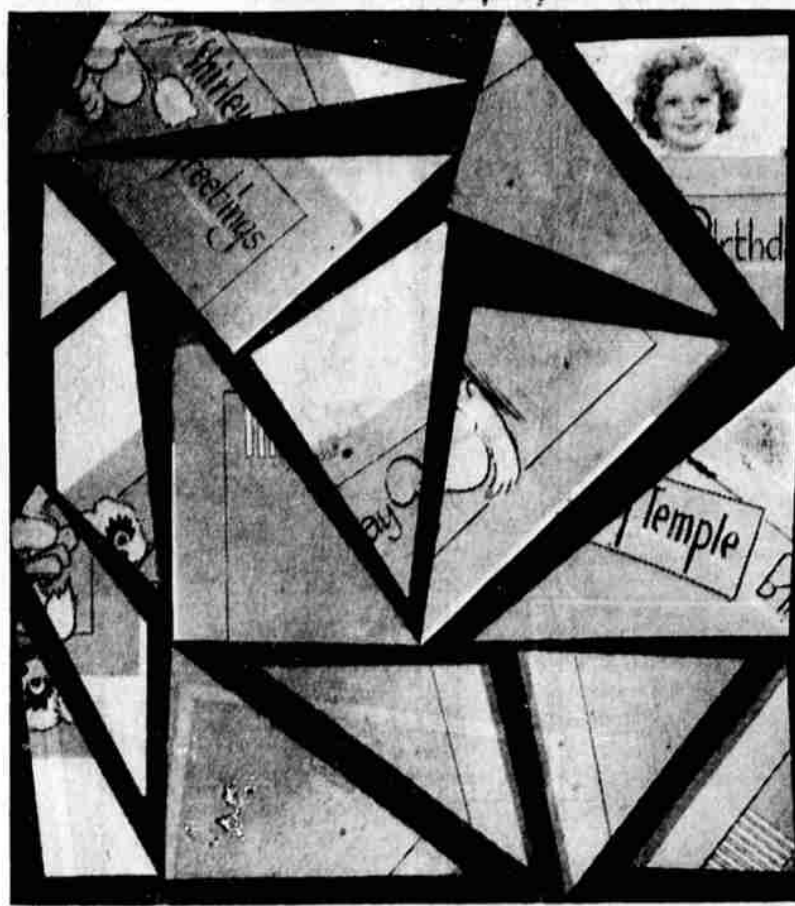
Obituary

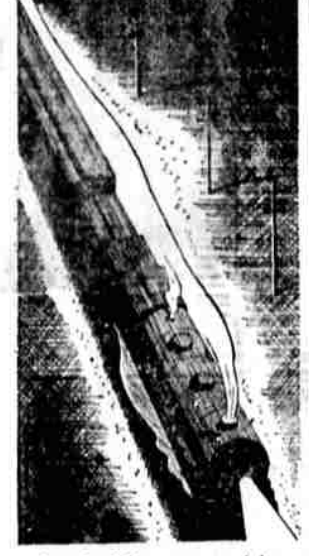
