

GRANGE AID ASKED FOR WESTSIDE ROAD

FORT KLAMATH, Ore.—The regular monthly meeting of Fort Klamath grange was held in the C. I. club house Tuesday evening, with worthy Master M. L. Ferguson in the chair, 29 members and six visitors being present.

During the business session, application of Miss Ellen Brown of Crystal, Ore., for membership in the local grange was read by the secretary. The quarterly report to the state secretary was also read at this time, showing financial and membership status of the grange.
