## LIVERPOOL SALE MADE AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (AP)—The world is bidding for Pacific northwest wheat and flour. Confirmation of the sale of at least 1000 tons of wheat to Liverpool and several cargoes was obtained by the Journal today. Demand is worldwide and only the matter of getting sufficient ocean tonnage is expected to keep sales from assuming record proportions.

Sales of 51,000 barrels of flour from the Pacific northwest within the period of three days, broke all record for business with the Philippines.

Japan and north China are reported anxiously inquiring for flour, the former due in measure to its boycott against Australia.

On the Portland cash wheat market soft white varieties within the period of three days, broke all record for business with the demand keen and farmers not selling.

On the Portland futures market there was a closing advance of 1/2c in September, 1/2c in December while May was nominally unchanged. Sales included 8000 bushels December. Local cash wheat was 11-2 1/2c higher with Montana down 1c for spring and unchanged for winter.
