Grayson Picks Huskies

Stanford Assistant Declares Washington Will Be Team to Beat in Football Next Fall. Softball League Continues to Meet Expenses.

Take it from Bobby Grayson, the University of Washington Huskies are going to be the team to defeat for the Pacific Coast conference championship this fall.

Bobby, former all-American fullback at Stanford, made this statement in his home town of Portland. Grayson, who gained the top ranking for three years in a row, is a former Oregon athlete, starting in all sports during his high school days at Jefferson.

The young man will want to know everything he can about every other member of the conference, for this fall he will be an assistant coach at Stanford. If he says Washington is going to be strong, most likely he is right.

From end to end, the Husky line will be in the battle when September rolls around. The team hasn't lost a man from the 1935 squad.

Gain and Haines—Haines being the lad who used to run wild for Bend high school—will return to take up their backfield jobs. They are reckoned among the shiftest ball carriers in the conference.

Outside of Washington, Grayson lists Oregon State as the most promising team in the northwest.

Nickels and dimes from Modoc field speculators have turned the softball league into a financial success—if you can call it "finance" when an organization averages about \$11 each night it operates.

But it doesn't take much cash to run the league and there isn't anyone in it for a profit. Field expenses, lights, balls and the umpire's salary run about \$10 a night for each doubleheader.

If these small but exceedingly welcome returns from the crowd continue, the league will pay its way without any difficulty.

It's the rough and tough Glendale Loggers versus the rollicking Red Sox from Klamath Falls for the Southern Oregon league's 1936 pennant.

It's Clyde Carlstrom, the Red Sox' sweetheart, with the huge curve ball and booming fast one versus the Loggers' darling, Merle Johnson, also with a thundering high hard one and razor-edged hook.

It's one game, played on the neutral Grants Pass field for the prize that has hung in the balance through 12 tough weeks of ding-dong pennant scrap.

The two contesting teams emerged from the triple tie for first place last week with Glendale hammering Grants Pass' Bob Hardy hard for a 7-5 win at Glendale and the Red Sox out-slugging their sister team, the Pelicans, 8-2.

The playoff for the title marks the second straight year the pennant has had to be decided by an extra game. Last season the Red Sox and Grants Pass played a three-game series, with the Sox taking the odd battle and the championship.

Glendale and the Red Sox were both in favor of only one game this year, to be held on a neutral field, as both teams have outside games booked.

In four battles between the two teams so far this year, the Loggers hold a three-out-of-four edge. At Glendale, on May 17, the Loggers won 2-0 behind Johnson's six-hit pitching. Lowell Brown was in

the box for the Red Sox. On June 7, the Red Sox evened the count at Klamath Falls, 7-4. Turpin was the winning pitcher and Johnson the losing one. Again at Glendale, on June 28, the Loggers eked out a 4-3 victory in a pitchers' duel between Johnson and Carlstrom, and on July 26, at Klamath Falls, Glendale again took the measure of the Sox, 4-2, as Johnson hurled great ball in the pinches. Al Hogan was on the mound for the Sox.

Manager Jake Gipe of the Loggers will start Johnson on the mound, with Rex Adamson back of the plate. Vernon Francis, Red Sox skipper, will have Carlstrom on the mound and Granger back of the bat. Both teams are at their full strength.

The game will be played with 60 per cent of the gate going to the winners. Umpires will be Oakes and Riggs.

The season's largest crowd is expected at the Josephine county fairgrounds for the pennant battle, with caravans of Klamath Falls and Glendale rooters making the jaunt to lend their moral support to their teams.

INDIANS NOW RUNNERS-UP

Beaver Defeat of Mission, Seattle Loss to Padres, Change Standings.

The Seattle Indians, leading the Coast league by four full games less than two weeks ago, held a runner-up position to Portland today after extra-inning games in the northwest last night.

The Beavers finished up their short series with the San Francisco Missions by winning a 10-inning game, 2-1, while the rocketing San Diego Padres knocked the Tribe out of the league leadership, 5-3, in 11 frames.

A pitching castoff, who found a haven in the San Diego dugout, was largely responsible for the change in leadership. Dick Ward, released earlier in the season by Sacramento, pitched the entire 11 innings, allowed only seven hits, and scored the deciding run himself in the last bracket. The contest went extra innings because Ward grooved one for Larry Donovan in the second inning, and two men scored ahead of the resulting homer. In Wednesday night's game, Howard Craighead, Seattle castaway, humbled his former teammates. Ward and Craighead have consistently won for the Padres since joining the club.

Only snappy playing and good pinch-hurling by the veteran Walter Stewart kept Portland from

winning earlier than it did last night. Stewart was nipped for 17 hits during the evening, but managed to limit the Beavers to a single run for nine innings. In the 10th, however, Catcher Earl Drucker singled, went to third on Fred Hodson's fourth hit of the game, and tallied on Pete Coscaratti's bingle. The Missions ruined a "George Caster night" for the pitcher Tuesday, by knocking him off the hill in one inning, but he got revenge last night.

Oakland triumphed over San Francisco, 6-4, for the first time in the three-game series, as a result of a five-run rally in the seventh. Only one earned run was made off young Bob Cole, who saw an inexperienced substitute third baseman, Ernie Ralmond, throw the game away. Jimmy Hitchcock hit four out of five times, one a double, for Oakland.

Dutch Lieber outpitched three Solon slabsters to win a 6-4 verdict for Los Angeles.

New series open tonight with San Diego playing a double-header in Portland. In single games, the Missions play at Seattle, Sacramento at San Francisco, and Oakland at Los Angeles.
