## County Agent Sees Klamath Income Boost

County Agent C. A. Henderson told the Kiwanis club Thursday that lumbering and agriculture, combined, may bring a total income of \$29,000,000 to the Klamath country this year.

His statement came on the same day on which a survey, in which he assisted, indicated definitely that this will be the biggest agricultural year in Klamath history.

Henderson told the Kiwanians that lumbering revenue last year was estimated at a little more than \$9,000,000, and that he understands that this year it will go over \$10,000,000, and possibly higher.

He said he does not believe he is overly optimistic in placing the estimate on this year's agricultural income at \$8,000,000, and he said that there is a possibility that it may go hundreds of thousands of dollars higher than that.
