On the
Day's News

INTERESTING news, of various kinds, in the papers these days. In Europe, the big news (apart from the Olympic games, where American athletes are piling up increasing laurels) has to do with present wars and the possibility of future wars.

Civil war is raging in Spain, and Europe is jittery over the prospect that disastrously serious wars may arise out of this comparatively small one.

THE French, for example, fear that the German plan is to aid the Spanish rebels.

If that should come about, it seems probable that Russia would come to the aid of the existing Spanish government, which is communistic.

The present government of Germany is suspected of leanings toward the communistic government of Spain. Germany and Italy, on the other hand, lean toward the fascist rebels who are seeking to overthrow the Spanish communists.

The possibilities of trouble that are involved in this situation are not hard to see.

YOU noticed the other day that a German ship was shelled by a Spanish (communistic) warship. Please note now that Germany is kicking up a loud disturbance over that incident, which rather seems to indicate that Germany is looking for an excuse to discipline the present government of Spain.

If that is true, it is significant.

ON this side of the water, we are interested in reviving business.

The stock market, which is both a vehicle for large-scale gambling and an exceedingly sensitive barometer of business conditions, overcomes the fears inspired by the touchy political situation in Europe and reaches a new high level for the past five years.

That means that at the present moment, at least, buyers believe that business is going to get better in this country, and as a result stocks are going up in price.

So buyers on the stock exchange outnumber sellers, and prices go up.

IT is pleasant to note that while Europe is thinking chiefly of wars that seem inevitable, we are beginning to turn our thoughts to the improvement of business. War means sorrow and suffering and poverty, whereas improvement of peace-time business means higher standards of living.

EUROPE is a powder keg that might be exploded at any moment by a stray spark—such, for example, as the shelling of a German freighter by a Spanish warship.

Europe has been made into a powder keg by the constant incitement of class hatred. This arming of class against class HAS NOT brought happiness and comfort and prosperity to the common people of Europe. Instead, it has resulted in the rise of dictatorships which now threaten to plunge Europe again into war.

In this country, there are many schemers and demagogues who are hawking constantly on the class hatred string, seeking in that way to build themselves up. Let us hope as fervently as we ever hoped anything that they FAIL.

The fruit of class hatred is WAR. Europe is furnishing plenty of proof of that right now.

Glenn Morris Breaks Own
Record With Total
Of 7900 Points

OWENS, METCALFE
IN RELAY EVENT

American Group Equals
World Record In
Baton Contest

BERLIN, Aug. 8 (AP)—Breaking his own world record with a brilliant series of performances in which he amassed 7900 points, Glenn Morris, Fort Collins, Colo., auto salesman, won the Olympic decathlon championship today as his compatriots, Bob Clark and Jack Parker, finished second and third, giving the United States her first sweep of the event in Olympic history.

Boats Corner Mark
The 24-year-old former Colorado State football and track star, who took up decathlon competition just a year ago, surpassed his former world mark made in the American tryouts two months ago at Milwaukee by an even one hundred points. Clark, who hails from San Francisco and is a former national A. A. U. all-around champion, captured runner-up honors while Parker of Sacramento, with an aggregate of 7601 points, took third with 7275 points.

With Jesse Owens and Ralph Metcalfe inserted in the lineup, America's 400-meter relay team equaled the world record of 40 seconds flat in winning the first heat of the trials and qualifying for the finals. Both relay finals will be held tomorrow.

Volmari Ish-Holm, Finnish ace, romped away with the 3000-meter steeplechase title for the second time in a row, and Japan's formidable swimmers served notice on the world they will not easily be relieved of the team honors they won four years ago at Los Angeles.

The blanket finish in the gruelling two-day ten-event decathlon.

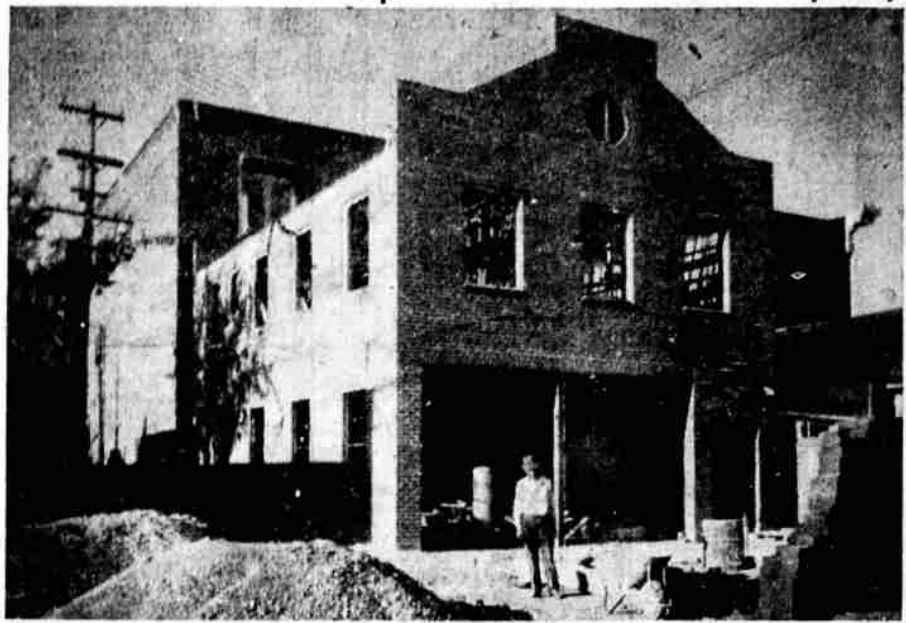
"I think he has already committed himself to support the republican ticket," Hamilton said.

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REFORMS IN
FOREST PLAN
HELD NEEDED

Scientific Sustained Yield
Urged By Special
Committee Today

PRESSURE MUST
BE ALLEVIATED

Forced Liquidation Held
Menace To Industry
In Report By Buck

PORTLAND, Aug. 8 (AP)—Continued operation of Oregon's forest industries in the future on the present basis will be possible only if improved management practices are adopted at once, the advisory committee of forestry of the state planning board warned today.

The report, prepared by C. J. Buck, regional forester and vice chairman of the planning board, pointed out that the annual growth of forests in recent years has been not more than 50 per cent of the annual cut.

Must Stop Pressure
With proper management, the rate of growth can be increased three-fold, assuring long-time occupation to those engaged in forest industries, which support about 30 per cent of the state's population, said the survey.

The intense pressure put on private timber owners to liquidate their holdings must be alleviated, the report declares, and at the same time means must be found to encourage sustained yield methods of operation.

Three means were suggested as an aid to such a program—the first a system of long-term credit; the second, a system of immediate liquidation will not be necessary; second, adjustment of methods of taxation that will make it possible for owners to hold timber and at the same time will encourage sustained yield, and third, a more equitable balance between private owners and the public.

The third could be accomplished by public acquisition of cut-over land, second growth, and mature timber, with both the state and federal government participating in the program.

Scope Given
The scope of the lumber industry in Oregon was noted in figures showing that in 1935 it employed 52,000 persons, or 33.5 per cent of Oregon workers, and was exceeded only by agriculture, which employed 52,000 or 32.7 per cent. In cash income it exceeded farm products, with \$181,700,000 for the year 1929 to \$129,300,000 for agriculture. It was also estimated that an additional 76,000 persons were employed.

LEFTIST ARMIES
DRIVE FORWARD

Victories in Three Sectors Reported; Rebels Move On Madrid

MADRID, Aug. 8 (AP)—Revitalized leftist armies smashed through fascist lines in three sectors today in a new offensive.

Loyalist commanders reported capture of all towns surrounding the northeastern provincial capital of Huesca, advances in the Guadarrama mountain passes and suppression of an attempted revolt in southwestern Badajoz.

"The rebels are losing all hopes of winning the fight," the government asserted.

The new victories came after a sudden switch from impassioned defense to deadly offense by the leftist troops against the insurgent regiments.

The leftist militia also was reported to have occupied the town of Moralech in Granada province.

BURGOS, Spain, Aug. 8 (AP)—Rebel headquarters announced today that General Francisco Franco, commanding all the insurgent troops in the civil war, had begun his long-deferred advance on Madrid, personally heading a column of Moroccan troops.

Other advances have said General Franco is still in Spanish Morocco attempting to land additional troops on the Spanish peninsula. The number of troops from Africa already shuttled across the Gibraltar straits has been put as high as 6000. The rebel radio station at Tetife said Franco was in Seville.

Advices received here said the advancing rebel column from the south had defeated loyalists in two engagements.

**FULL HONORS GO
TO CONGRESSMAN**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—Congress leaders prepared today to pay full honors to Marion A. Zioncheck, while friends who had feared for some time that he would meet a tragic end expressed their grief over his death.

From his home in Alabama, Speaker Bankhead appointed a committee of representatives to attend the funeral. Kenneth A. Romney, house of representatives sergeant-at-arms, indicated he would fly to the rites.

Those appointed were Representatives Hill (D-Wash.), Martin F. Smith (D-Wash.), M. C. Wallgren (D-Wash.), and William A. Elwell (R-Oregon).

Romney, during the madcap adventures which punctuated Zioncheck's later days, had constantly striven to keep him out of trouble.

"He left here with a serious persecution complex," Romney said. "Probably his fate would have been the same had he remained here, and I am glad that I assisted him to go to the bedside of his sick mother before he died."

CONGRESSMAN
ENDS LIFE IN
SUDDEN JUMP

Body Falls Five Stories,
Crashes To Pavement
Near Wife's Car

WORK AND WORRY
BLAMED BY FRIENDS

Psychiatrist's Advice To
Withdraw from Race
Held Factor

SEATTLE, Aug. 8 (AP)—A five-story dive from his newly opened campaign office killed U. S. Representative Marion A. Zioncheck, Seattle's playboy congressman, and closed his erratic career today.

Hatless and coatless, the congressman struck a curbing a few feet from where his bride of 16 weeks, the former Ruby Louise Nix of Texarkana, Texas, waited last night in an automobile for him to come from the office in the Arctic building with his brother-in-law, William Nadeau of Seattle.

Inquest Set
Coroner Otto H. Hitteltstadt said Zioncheck apparently committed suicide. An inquest was set for Aug. 14.

When Zioncheck struck, his wife jumped from the automobile, ran to him, became hysterical and was taken to a hospital from which she went home a few hours later.

The congressman, turning as he fell, almost hit W. H. McFarlane, a broker, who stumbled over him.

While a crowd gathered, Zioncheck, head crushed, lay on the sidewalk until officers came.

Nadeau said a psychiatrist, Dr. Edward D. Hoedemaker, called by the family to observe Zioncheck, warned them to keep a close watch on him to prevent a suicide attempt. Dr. Hoedemaker confirmed this, but declined further comment.

"Leave me alone," Mrs. Zioncheck wailed in the hospital. "I don't want to see anyone or talk to anyone."

Work and worry over the advice of a psychiatrist that he must drop his campaign and take a long rest was blamed by friends and associates for the death plunge.

The young congressman had agreed to withdraw from the race for the democratic nomination, associates who refused to be quoted, disclosed.

Coroner Mitteltstadt visited the family today to try to learn what arrangements they prefer for the funeral services. He said that if the family is willing, he would assist in arranging a public funeral.

The congressional race in the first district to name Zioncheck's successor, already confused by the entry of 14 candidates, remained uncertain and the activity of candidates was stilled. Eight are democrats seeking.

**RULING ON RELIEF
QUESTION RELEASED**

SALEM, Aug. 8 (AP)—County relief committees have exclusive authority to determine whether or not property of a recipient of old age assistance shall be pledged as a guarantee of reimbursement of the funds so granted, Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today.

Van Winkle held that authority of the state relief committee to make rules for carrying out the provisions of the act was confined to matters as to which the act by its terms vests authority in the state relief committee.

"It cannot reasonably be extended to matters which are in conflict with the provisions of the act as amended," Van Winkle ruled.

The opinion was requested by the state relief committee.
