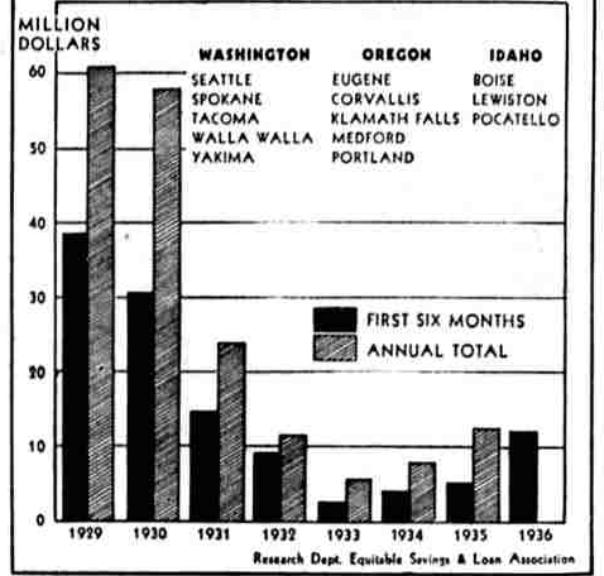
The store will be operated in conjunction with the Central meat market, managed by O. F. Konehot, which is housed in the same building.

Gain Here Aids Building Figure

SEMI-ANNUAL SURVEY OF BUILDING CONSTRUCTION



A local increase of 44 per cent helped boost northwest building construction in the first half of 1936 to a figure almost equal to the total for the 12 months of 1935. It is revealed by Pacific Northwest Building Data No. 4, compiled by the research department of the Equitable Savings & Loan association of Portland.

Thirteen key northwest cities are included in the Equitable's semi-annual survey of building construction. These are: Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma, Walla Walla and Yakima, Washington; Eugene, Corvallis, Klamath Falls, Medford and Portland, Oregon; and Boise, Lewiston and Pocatello, Idaho.

In the 13 cities surveyed, building construction rose from a

total of 5,641,087 in the first half of 1935 to \$12,087,444 in the corresponding period of this year, an increase of 114 per cent.

Local building volume advanced from \$45,494 in the first six months of 1935 to \$65,556 in the initial half of 1936.

"Building construction in the Pacific northwest, rising steadily since the 1933 depression low, is gaining this year at an accelerated pace," points out the Equitable's research department. "Last year's first half was 27 per cent above the 1934 first half, and this year's first half is 114 per cent above the like period of last year. There has been a 400 per cent improvement since the first six months of 1933."

SURVEY PLANNED IN LAKE COUNTY

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The Lake county court and the state and Lake county planning commissions will cooperate in the making of an inventory of all the land in the county to which the county owns the tax title. The inventory will consist of a card index system to show the year upon which the property was foreclosed; the name and address of the last owner; the legal description and acreage. The inventory will classify the land as to the economic uses to which it has or can be put. The records will also show the last assessed valuation, the improvements, if any, and the amount of taxes against the property at the time of foreclosure. It is estimated that the county owns approximately 200,000 acres.

The proposed inventory will be very valuable to Lake county

due to the fact that numerous sales and land exchanges are expected to be made to the federal government in the next few months.

CAPITOL WORK TO BEGIN NEXT MONTH

SALEM, Aug. 8 (AP)—Actual construction work on the new state capitol project will start shortly after September 2, when bids for preliminary work will be opened. J. A. McLean of Eugene, chairman of the capitol reconstruction committee, advised state officials here yesterday.

Bids will be called for immediately, McLean said. The work will include clearing the tract, erecting a fence around the building area, erecting field houses for use of the supervising architects and the WPA inspectors, and excavating the basement for the new building. The bids will not include construction of the building itself.

McLean said contracts for erection of the capitol building would probably be made in November, and that construction work would be under way by early December.
