

REFORMS IN FOREST PLAN HELD NEEDED

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played in service industries, thus making when family dependents are added, a total of 298,000 persons depending upon forests for support.

"Under a well-devised system of forest management and sustained yield operations, the number of persons supported by the lumber industry could be raised to 500,000," the report declares.

Other recommendations include: "The procedure governing the sale of timber from the national forests should be revised to make possible cooperative agreements for the sustained yield management of public and private land."

"There should be more adequate federal and state appropriations to aid in the fire protection of private timber."

"The management of reforestation lands should be brought into harmony with recent marginal land use policy and with the policy which governs the disposal of timber from national forests."

Must Fight Insects

"The state should take steps to relieve the counties of an increasing acreage of cut-over and burned-over forest lands which are reverting through tax foreclosures. Most of these lands could be blocked into state forests."

"Increased state and federal appropriations are urgently needed to aid in control of certain tree-destroying insects."

"Enabling legislation is needed to permit the state to take advantage of the Palmer act which would give financial aid to the state in acquiring state forests."

Oregon has about 261 billion board feet which can be considered as economically available for operating under the lumber market conditions which prevailed from 1925 to 1929, the report reveals. In addition 142 billion board feet might be cut if economic conditions are somewhat better than during the period just mentioned. The remaining 54 billion board feet are either low in quality or inaccessible.

Out of the total timber stand of the state, about 509 billion board feet is in the Douglas fir region, with 129 billion board feet or 45 per cent available. The remaining 97 billion board feet are in the pine region, with 62 billion board feet or 64 per cent available.

In meeting the national demands which can be reasonably expected, Oregon's forests might continue to be cut at the present rate for the next forty to fifty years, the report says.

Klamath Cited

It is more than probable that this will take place because some such period must elapse before the new growth forest of other timber areas of the United States will become commercially usable. With proper management, Oregon's forests can endure this impending drain, the survey said.

The report shows that the northwestern portion of the state is already facing the prospect of depletion. The situation was made materially worse by the heavy losses in the Tillamook fire of 1933. In the pine region east of the Cascade range, there has been heavy depletion in the areas contiguous to Bend and Klamath Falls.

With the present installed sawmill capacity in these localities operating at the present rate of cut, there will be a problem of exhausted private timber supply within the near future unless a plan of sustained yield management is immediately adopted, one which includes all the remaining government and private timber, it was predicted.

AMERICAN JOBLESS TOTAL 9,550,000

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—Commerce department officials, who have been quietly studying unemployment figures since 1933, estimated today that about 9,550,000 persons are out of work.

Ernest G. Draper, acting commerce secretary, said the department's figures represent a "composite estimate" of unemployment, and are based in part on statistics of other government agencies. For some time the department has been considering the feasibility of a census of jobless.

COLORADO MAN LEADS TEAM TO TRIUMPH

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athalon program, gave the United States her eleventh championship in 20 events completed thus far and was her second sweep of the competition. Americans also finished one-two-three in the high jump.

Clark led Morris by two points, 4194 to 4192, at the end of yesterday's five events, but the Coloradoan overhauled his Pacific coast rival in the first event today, the 100-meter hurdles which he cleared in 14.5 seconds to 15.9 for Clark, giving Morris a margin of 126 points.

Morris was given a tremendous ovation as he won the third and last heat in the 1500 meter run in the remarkable time of 4:32.2, adding 595 points and making up a record aggregate which exceeded by 20 points his own former mark.

Jesse Owens, jumping at the chance to return to competition in the 400-meter relay after three days of illness following his triple, conquest earlier in the week, started perfectly, giving America a five-meter lead during his assignment, which his mates, Ralph Metcalfe, Foy Draper and Frank Wykoff steadily swelled to 15 meters over the Italian team.

The quartet, which was not decided upon this morning after considerable controversy within the American camp, handled the baton perfectly as they outdistanced five rivals.

The American 1600-meter relay team out-distanced three rivals, breaking home with a margin of 35 meters in three minutes, 13 seconds in the first heat of the trials, the first two in each heat qualifying for tomorrow's final. Hungary, Poland and Japan finished blanketed in that order.

The American women's 400-meter relay team, Harriet Hland, St. Louis, Annette Rogers and Betty Robinson of Chicago, and Helen Stephens of Fulton, Mo., beat Canada by eight meters in the first heat as they were clocked in 47.1 seconds.

The German girls broke the world record in the second heat with a performance in 46.4 seconds, one-tenth of a second under their own mark set earlier this year.

SEATTLE, Aug. 7 (UP)—Rep. Marion A. Zioncheck, who jumped from his fifth story office to his death tonight, had never spoken of suicide to his family, his brother-in-law, William Nadeau, told the United Press tonight.

"There was no direct indication that Marion had been thinking of suicide," Nadeau said. "He had never mentioned it, but I could tell it from his actions. He had been brooding about the amount of adverse publicity he had received ever since he got back home."

"He never knew the full magnitude of it until a neighbor showed him a scrap book of clippings. He had been very much concerned about it since then."

ROSS TAKES HAND IN STRIKE TROUBLE

OROFINO, Idaho, Aug. 8 (AP) Gov. C. Ben Ross took a direct hand today in an effort to settle the north Idaho lumber strike which put half a dozen men in the hospital after a bloody clash and brought martial law to Clearwater county.

The governor left today for Pierce, the headquarters of the striking loggers, 10 miles east in rugged country, to "confer with I. W. W. leaders or whomsoever the strikers name to discuss their problems with me."

The governor would not discuss the details of the strike situation, he said, until he could talk over the conditions with people at Pierce.

Holly Brown Held on Beating Count

Holly Nathan Brown is being held in the county jail on charges of assault and battery in connection with the alleged beating of Tim Brown, aged Klamath Indian, by whom he was employed on the latter's ranch near Beatty.

The Indian, who is 74, is receiving treatment for multiple lacerations and bruises of the head and face, and is a patient at Hillside hospital. He was reported to be improving Saturday afternoon.

The alleged assailant, who is a white man, pleaded not guilty to the assault and battery charges in justice court Saturday morning.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 8 (AP)—Several persons were reported missing and at least one perished in a forest and brush fire that raged out of control today in the Markham area, about 50 miles north of Duluth.

Cracking through tinder-like woods, the flames had destroyed 36 farm homes.

Several persons were burned about the face and hands while transporting refugees. They were forced to drive through an area where flames lapped across narrow roads.

The victim was an unidentified man. He died when fire swept the Elfred Mack place eight miles south of Aurora.
