

FEDERAL MEN PAY VISIT TO PROJECT HERE

High officials of the department of the interior and the bureau of reclamation have visited the local reclamation project and Crater Lake national park this week.

John Harvey, chief of the classification division of the office of the secretary of the interior, was a visitor at the local office, and spent a portion of Thursday going over the Klamath project. He later visited Clear lake, and left Friday morning to continue his tour over the west, where he is visiting all branches of the interior department.

W. E. Mattingly, assistant director of the bureau of the budget, arrived in Klamath Falls Friday morning. He was met at the station by David Canfield, superintendent of Crater Lake national park, and by E. L. Stevens, assistant engineer of the Klamath reclamation project.

Mattingly and Canfield left at once for the park, stopping at Klamath Agency for a conference. In the afternoon he accompanied Stevens on a tour of the Klamath project, during which requirements for appropriations to continue construction work on the Tule lake division for the fiscal year of 1938 were pointed out by the local official.

Mattingly and Stevens left Saturday morning in a government car for the Central Valley project in California. They were scheduled to meet Walker R. Young, engineer in charge, at the Klamath dam this side of Redding, early in the day.

George O. Sanford, general supervisor of operation and maintenance for the bureau of reclamation, accompanied by B. E. Hayden, supervisor of district No. 5, and superintendent of the Klamath reclamation project, arrived in Klamath Falls Wednesday evening for a visit in Klamath county. He met with directors of the Klamath Irrigation district during his stay, and also with the executive boards of the Pine Grove and Enterprise Irrigation districts, discussing the matter of possible developments of power on the "C" canal drop. This matter was submitted to a vote of the water users early this spring, and was defeated.

Sanford left Friday night for Yakima, Wash. Irrigation project. Hayden met Sanford with a government car late last week at Sacramento, and accompanied him on a visit to the Newlands project at Fallon, Nev., where they held a conference with water users.

On Sunday evening they returned to Orland, Calif., where a conference relative to the proposed new contract provided for in recent legislation was held.

CORRECTION

Recently a story from the CCC camp at Clear lake stated that the Clear lake refuge is being fenced. C. G. Fence is being built along two miles of shore line on the south side of Clear lake, and a water gap will be left for stock.

FINE PAID

Walter Phoma of the Merrill creamery paid a fine of \$10 Friday afternoon upon pleading guilty to charges of selling adulterated food before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes. Complaint against the Merrill creamery specifically charged sale of butter containing less than 80 per cent milk fat. The case has been continued from July 16.

YAMHILL, Aug. 8 (AP)—State Senator Peter Zimmerman, independent candidate for governor in 1938, said today he "doubted" that Representative Lemke's name would be on the ballot in Oregon as the third party candidate for president. "There seems to be a conspiracy" to keep Lemke's name off the ballot. In commenting on the strike of men circulating petitions for signatures, Zimmerman said: "We can't afford to pay seven cents a name. That would be \$70 a thousand and I got a letter from Earl Snell (secretary of state) saying that he'd need 24,000 instead of 16,000 names. Petition circulators, who have been receiving three cents a signature, struck for seven cents."

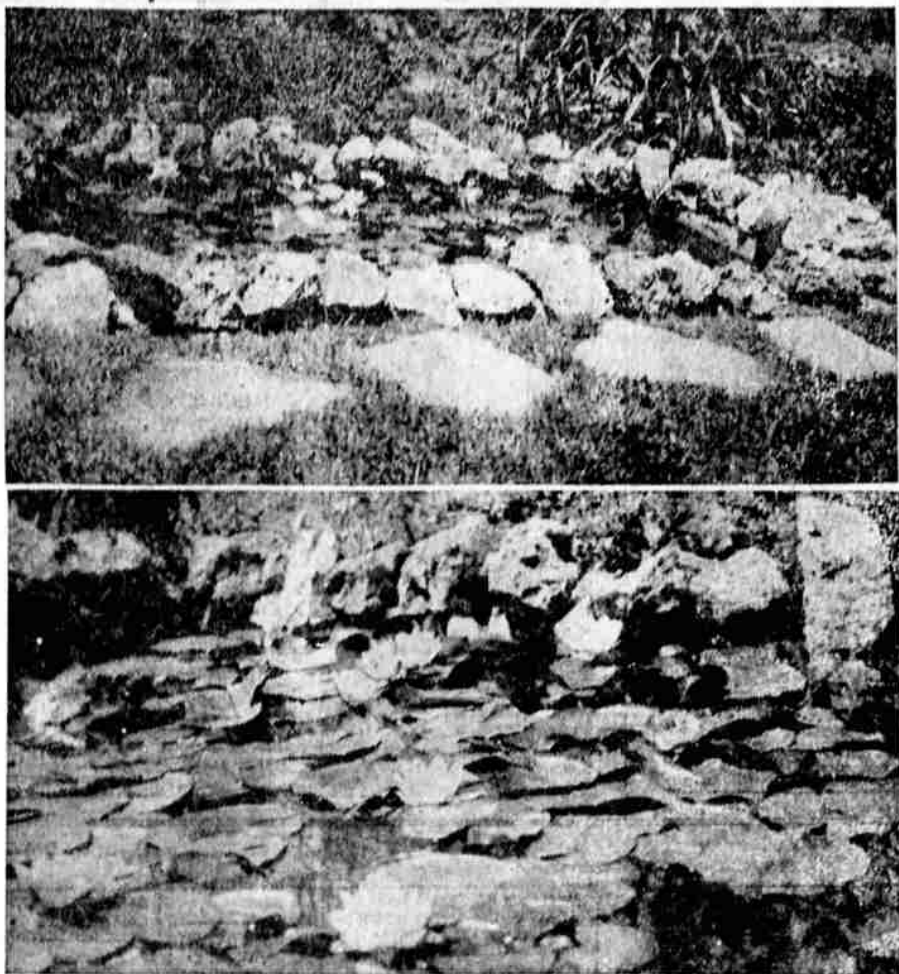
