The corn crop of only 1,429,135,000 bushels is the smallest indicated harvest in more than 50 years.

Winter wheat, 14,596,000 bushels.

Oats, condition, 93 per cent of normal, estimated production, 10,918,000 bushels, estimated last month, 10,304,000.

Potatoes, condition, 89 per cent of normal, estimated production, 6,880,000, estimated last month, 6,920,000.

MINOR PETITIONS BEFORE TAX BOARD

Four minor petitions for correction of assessment were filed with the equalization board for Klamath county in its opening session Monday, according to Charles Mack, assessor.

Mack has arranged for a hearing for lumber mill operators to be held August 20, when Kenneth Murdoch and Jess Gilkey, timber and mill appraisers for the Oregon tax commission, and Charles Galloway, chairman of the commission, will be here.

This hearing will probably be the most important of the equalization board's sessions, since the re-appraisal of all mills in the county has called forth much opposition on the part of operators. The re-appraisal was conducted this spring by Gilkey and Murdoch, and was the first change in mill assessments in the past six years, according to Mack. The re-appraisal resulted in increase in tax assessments for virtually all mills in the county. It is expected that about 20 operators will attend the meeting.

There will also be a hearing for livestock operators during the month's session of the equalization board, according to the assessor.

The mill and livestock petitions will probably be the major events of the session, Mack stated, as other assessments have remained virtually the same as last year's.

Those desiring to file protest

for tax assessments are required to do so within the first 15 days the equalization board is in session, according to state law.

Police were called to the 900 block on Klamath avenue Saturday afternoon where the injured woman was found, and Special Indian Officer John Arkell was called after she received first aid treatment.

BIRTHS DOUBLE DEATHS

Births in Klamath county for the 30-day period from July 10 to August 10 more than doubled the number of deaths for the same time. The number of births was set at 51, and deaths totaled 21.

MAN INJURED BY HIT-RUN DRIVER

Pavich Nich, 44, of route No. 2, received a broken rib and a gash in his head Saturday afternoon when a hit-and-run driver crashed into his automobile at the intersection of Elm and Commercial streets.

Nich reported that he lost consciousness after the shock of the impact, and that when he revived the other machine had vanished. Alvin Salver of 2144 Wantland avenue, sustained a cut arm on the evening of August 7, when his bicycle was struck by an automobile driven by William Henry Dyer. The accident occurred at 6:00 p. m.

A minor automobile collision, which occurred at the intersection of California avenue and Nevada street, was reported to police bureau Saturday afternoon by Ralph Austad and James J. Bowen, operators of the machines involved. No injuries resulted.

Another Saturday afternoon accident occurred when a parked automobile registered to F. D. McMillan was struck by a truck operated by Benjamin Clark on North Ninth street. McMillan's automobile was slightly damaged, according to police reports.
