EXPERIMENTAL CROP PROVES SUCCESSFUL

C. A. Henderson reports an interesting visit to the R. S. Hartler ranch in Hildebrand recently, when Hartler stated that in 1935 a quarter of an acre of dry land planted to crested wheat grass yielded him approximately 135 pounds in seed.

Hartler has a half acre planted to the crop this season, and present surveys indicate that about 200 pounds of seed will be harvested from the plot.

The county agent stated that to his knowledge, Hartler's is the first crested wheat harvested in this county.

Crested wheat is a grass which is proving very satisfactory for range improvement and soil conservation on ranges and in semi-arid districts.

The crested wheat crop is particularly short in Montana, Wyoming and the Dakotas, where the major portion of this seed is usually produced.

Oregon and Idaho, however, have good crops with each state's crop estimated from 75,000 to 100,000 pounds. This will be the major portion of all the seed produced in the United States this year, which means an increased price to growers. The bulk of the crop is already sold, Henderson said, with prices ranging from 40 to 50 cents a pound.

The county agent also inspected Ladak alfalfa on the Hartler ranch, where nine acres of dry land are planted to this crop.

He estimated that the amount of hay in stack that the yield had been about three tons per acre on the first cutting. This shows some increase in yield over neighboring Grimm alfalfa, and a very great increase over adjacent common alfalfa.

Second cutting of alfalfa is under way throughout the county, and the agricultural agent reports that the crop as a whole is the best he has ever seen in this district. The growth has been rapid, giving excellent quality, as well as a heavy yield, and few weeds are evident.

The second cutting falling so early in the season virtually assures a third cutting in many districts, further increasing Klamath county's bumper hay crop for this season.

DRUM CORPS LEAVES HERE ON TUESDAY

With their officers and a color guard, 39 members of the Klamath Falls American Legion drum corps, the largest corps in Oregon, leave Tuesday night to compete at Roseburg Friday during the state American Legion convention.

Besides the regular players, the corps has its own police escort sent by Mayor Willis Mahoney and the council. Louis Arnold, Legionnaire, and motorcycle officer, will lead the corps in the street appearance.

Among the favorites to win the 1936 state championship are Corvallis, Astoria, Portland and Klamath Falls.

Many of this city plan driving over for the competition Friday morning, the big meet to start at 8:00 p. m. on Finlay field.

Two coaches of Legionnaires and drum corps members will leave Tuesday evening over the Southern Pacific at 9:30 p. m.

Wednesday morning they breakfast at Eugene at 8 a. m., meet city officials two hours later and then parade in the university city. They are scheduled to arrive at Roseburg at 2:30 p. m. where they will be taken to registration headquarters. A rally and parade as a publicity stunt for this city will follow.

Members of the drum corps are requested to report at the Legion hall at 8 p. m. Tuesday.

Long Lost Plane Found in Alaska; Bones Discovered

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 10 (UP)—An airplane, believed to be the "Service Airline plane" lost a year ago while on a flight to Alaska, was found Saturday by John Hajdukovich, Carl Twelken, and William Meomnn while on a search for gold deposits.

The three men came upon the wreckage on the watershed of the Healy river on the upper Tanana, near the center of the Black mountains, at an altitude of between 4500 feet and 5200. The pilot, Arthur F. Hines and his passengers, John F. Lonn and wife and Elton Nordalo, were burned in the wreckage. Nothing but bones remained with the charred ship.
