

## Montgomery Takes Grudge Match from Chick

### HUBKA WINS FROM WOLFE

#### Oklahoman Gains Victory Over Walter Stratton in Opener.

Bullet-necked Bob Montgomery, powerhouse wrestler from Georgia, scored another armory victory Tuesday night when he stopped Bobby Chick of Wyoming in the main event.

Montgomery had a grudge against Chick and he satisfied himself when he sent the husky cowboy kicking for the third and deciding fall. A week ago Chick, acting as a referee, disqualified Montgomery for fouling Les Wolfe.

Georgian Takes Opener  
Montgomery, short, broad and mean, went to work early on his opponent and dropped him for the first fall in an even five minutes. Chick was trapped in a Boston crab hold.

Less than four minutes after coming out for the second period, Chick, using some of the same rough stuff pulled off by the Georgian, squared the match. He gained the fall with a headlong dive that connected with the pit of Montgomery's stomach. Chick clinched the fall with a body press.

Second Fall Rough  
The second fall was rough all the way. Bounced out of the ring, Montgomery had difficulty in getting back inside the ropes. Each time he pulled himself off the floor in front of the ringside seats, Chick gave him a kick that flipped him back.

Referee Ray Fribble finally intervened to permit the match to get back on a more formal basis. The third fall, coming as a surprise, was the climax of the hard match. Tossed from the ring again and kicked repeatedly, the big southerner watched his chance and then let Chick have a shoulder butt from outside the ropes.

Referee Goes Down  
Chick went down in a heap and carried the referee with him. In a moment, Montgomery leaped the ropes and bounded on his opponent to take the final fall in 6 minutes and 28 seconds.

One of the largest crowds in recent weeks watched the two heavyweights settle their differences. Sentiment was entirely with Chick, the loser.

Hubka Has Challenge  
Just before the match got under way, Joe Hubka, hard-hitting ex-fallback from the University of Nebraska, challenged the winner.

For speed and science the windup between Wolfe and Hubka won first choice. Hubka, winning the single fall with a combination body scissors and pile driver, emerged the victor in the second round.

### Jack Medica Gives America Victory in Swim Meet

BERLIN, Aug. 12 (AP)—A record-smashing performance by Jack Medica of Seattle gave the United States her first Olympic men's swimming victory today.

The husky Pacific coast star captured the 400 meter free style championship in four minutes, 44.5 seconds after 13-year-old Marjorie Gestring of Los Angeles and her two team mates swept the springboard diving championship.

The "Seattle Seal" came from behind to overtake Japan's crack Shunji Uto in the last 20 meters and clip one full second off the former Olympic mark hung up by Uto in the preliminary trials.

Medica's time, however, was considerably slower than the world record of 4:38.7 he made two years ago.

Adolph Kiefer of Chicago, star of the men's team, shattered the eight-year-old Olympic record in winning his heat in the trials of the Olympic 100-meter back stroke event.

The Chicagoan captured the first of five preliminary heats in one minute, 6.9 seconds, bettering George Kojac's mark of 1:05.2, as well as the listed world record of 1:07.4 made by Al Vande Weghe of Paterson, N. J., two years ago at Honolulu.

Kiefer won by a margin of a length and a half over the Japanese star, Masaji Koyokawa.
